


A Harvard University study concludes that the more you're involved in the long-term plan, the more successful you can be. So if you want your life to be successful, focus on the long-term plan, not on the short-term plan. If you focus on today, here and now, the possibility of success will go down. So their advice is that we need a clear long-term picture or plan. By the same token, we need a clear vision for our church.

Jesus was the ultimate vision caster. Let me show you some of the visionary statements made by Jesus. "Look around and see how the fields are ripe for harvesting." "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you can move this mountain." "Go and make disciples of all nations." And in like manner John Wesley the founder of our Methodist Church said, "The World is my parish."

What kind of vision do we have for our church? It's a mosaic of Jesus. A Mosaic church is the vision that God has given to us, I believe. I shared this image a couple of years ago but stopped talking about it for almost two years. Now I am willing to bring this image back to our attention. Over the last couple of weeks I have prayed for the vision and direction of our church, this image came back to me again and again. I believe, both as a pastor and a person in faith journey, this is the vision God gives us to our church.

This is biblically sound and contextually appealing. There are many biblical sources supporting this image for us. Here are some of many examples. Jesus prayed for us to become one, "I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in my and I am in you, may they believe that you have sent me." (John 17: 20-21). Paul wrote in his letter to the Christians in Galatia, "... for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith... There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, hairs according to the promise" (Galatians 3:26-29). And we gather together in the name of Jesus Christ, relying on his promise, "Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20).



A mosaic is a design or decoration made up of small pieces of colored material. In a mosaic, no piece is outstanding or dominating, but instead working together and making a beautiful picture together. In the church, as a mosaic, everybody is special, everybody is unique, and everybody is needed. Differences are accepted; diversities are cherished. Generational, age, gender, racial, ethnic, cultural, and political differences and diversities are gathered here. All the pieces are making harmony and one picture and together we are making a church. This is our vision.



He's There...for you

One of the most comforting thoughts is knowing that someone is "there for you". Maybe it's a friend, your spouse, a parent or perhaps a teacher or someone you work with? Through the good times and bad, it's reassuring to know that someone who cares about you is nearby, many times offering the encouragement we need just by their presence, without even saying a word.

As I look back on my earlier years, I realize how fortunate I was to have my dad. He was a dad that was there for me through thick and thin. Pee wee football game on Sunday morning? Dad was there. Wrestling match on Wednesday night, when he worked the afternoon shift? He found a way to make it. Christmas choir at the middle school? Dad was there. And yes, through the troublesome times as well. Got sent to the principal? Dad would field the call. Trouble in the dorms at college? Not a pleasant phone call, but I knew I could count on him to help.

Dad is no longer with me in the physical sense, but he is sure there spiritually. In fact, there's times when I think I'm asking for more advice from him now than I did while he was here.

When we look for someone to be in our corner, what an opportunity Lent gives us to reflect on the One who never leaves our side. Going far beyond what any human could do, Jesus came into the world to save us, to forgive us, to be there for us in every circumstance, every day. When we think about the meaning of Lent and continue to prepare during the 40 days leading up to Jesus' resurrection, all we need to do is look toward the Cross to know that Jesus is there, for us.

Jesus, in His human body, sacrificed His life so we could live. He did for us what no one else could do, or will ever do. As He walked toward his brutal Crucifixion, He knew exactly what He was doing and why. He endured the physical pain for our sins, so we could be forgiven and live our eternal lives with Him.

Lent is a time of deep reflection, and Easter is a time of celebration. We all look for someone in our lives to be there for us, and we're always thankful to when they are there for us. Let's remem-

ber, as Christians, that Jesus' crucifixion is proof that He was there, is there and will be there for us, for eternity. Putting our Faith in the Lord guarantees His presence in our lives, today and every day. His empty tomb on that first Easter Sunday re moved any doubt from the minds of His followers then, and remains the foundation of our Faith today.

Yes, we do enjoy the comfort and confidence know that there's someone there for us, and every Lenten Season, we remember, as we look at the Cross, that Jesus is there for us, through every challenge we face. God our Father raised Jesus up - and Jesus will never let us down.

Journey Through Holy Week

Holy Week is the time that we, as the church, commemorate, reflect upon, and reenact the life, suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In Western Christianity, each day of Holy Week has its own significance and particular celebrations. In general, the church is encouraged to follow the biblical stories corresponding to each day represented in Holy Week: beginning with Christ's entry into Jerusalem on a donkey, moving through the Last Supper and the Crucifixion, and leading us toward the Resurrection on Easter morning. The Holy Week story highlights the contrast between the excitement and celebration at the beginning of the week, the sadness and suffering throughout week, and the miraculous and joyous nature of its ending.

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday (also known as Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion), the last Sunday in the Lenten Season, commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem preceding his crucifixion. As he entered, the people of Jerusalem recognized Jesus as their long-awaited messiah king, waving palms and shouting "Hosanna to the Son of David; Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" What would it have been like to walk in the midst of the crowd, celebrating the new king?

Good Friday

Good Friday (from the German "Gute Freitag," meaning "good, holy, or God's Friday") is perhaps the most solemn and profound day of Holy Week. This day commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus as the pinnacle of the week, experienced with great humility and reverence. One of the oldest traditions of this day is the Veneration of the Cross, where the faithful honor a wooden cross with ritual acts of devotion. What would it have been like to kneel at the foot of the cross, facing the suffering and death of a beloved friend?

Holy Thursday

Holy or Maundy Thursday (from the Latin "Dias Mandatum," meaning "the day of the new commandment") is a celebration of the last supper that Jesus took with his disciples, family, and friends. It was during this traditional Passover meal that Jesus initiated the Christian sacrament of the Eucharist, also known as the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion. What would it have been like to sit around the table, receiving the bread and wine from Jesus' hands?

Easter Sunday

Easter Sunday follows Holy Week, the end of the season of Lent. Easter (also called the "Pascha") is the traditional feast celebrating Jesus' resurrection from the dead and begins the fifty-day season of the church year called Eastertide. Easter is a time of great joy and miraculous wonder as we celebrate the presence of the risen Lord in our lives. What would it have been like to stand with the risen Lord that first Easter morning, experiencing the joy of a new way of life?









Two Members to Zimbabwe!

On July 14th, Henry Walter and Darcianne Leizer will be joining a volunteer in mission team of 9 people going to Zimbabwe as a relationship building team. The team will be visiting Africa University, Fairfield Children's Homes orphanage, Ishe Anesu school, as well as spending time at Mutambara Methodist Mission

Majority of the time will be at the Mutambara Methodist Mission, where the team will be doing light construction projects, painting rooms and working on sewing and cooking projects with the pregnant women who stay there for a month awaiting delivery of their babies. At Fairfield Orphanage and Ishe Anesu School the team will participate in activities with the children of the school and orphanage, with crafts, games and reading time.

This mission trip is the church mission fund at work. Both Henry and Darcianne received money toward the trip from the mission fund that is supplied by the pumpkin sales each year. Thank you for your continued monetary support, prayers and time for mission trips.

Dr. and Mrs. Mefor's are missionaries with the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church

and their home country is Nigeria, Africa. Dr. Emmanuel Ufonna Mefor, a medical doctor, while his wife, Florence Ogugua Mefor is a nurse mid-wife.

Dr. Mefor, a native of Kano, Nigeria, Emmanuel earned his medical degree at the University of Maiduguri College of Medicine in Maiduguri, Borno State, Nigeria. In 1997 Dr. Mefor began his service with GBGM as a Person in Mission (PIM) through the Global Mission Partners program. He served as a general practitioner at Chicuque Hospital in Mozambique from 1995 to 2003, and from 2003 until late 2006 he was with the UMC Rural Health Program in his home country.

Mrs. Mefor is a native of Abatete, Nigeria. Florence became a registered midwife following studies at the School of Midwifery in Awgu, Nigeria. She earned her nursing degree from the School of Nursing in Jos and spent 14 years nursing at the Evangel Hospital in Jos, which is in Nigeria's Plateau State. Florence served at the Chicuque Hospital in Mozambique from 1999 to 2003, and in her home country with the UMC Rural Health Program from 2003 until late 2006. Before her commissioning as a GBGM missionary, she served at Chicuque as a person in mission(PIM) through the GBGM's Global Mission Partners program.

Dr. and Mrs. Mefor have three children, Chukwuebuka, Osita Jude, and Anulika. The potluck dinner will be at 6pm followed by Dr. and Mrs. Mefor speaking about their mission. United Methodist bishop part of By Christopher Fenoglio "Finding Jesus" series on CNN

A United Methodist bishop contributes to several new episodes in a television series about notable individuals and events during the time of Jesus.

Bishop Minerva G. Carcaño, from the California-Nevada Annual Conference, provides expert commentary in the latest season of "Finding Jesus: Faith, Fact, Forgery" airing Sunday evenings at 9 p.m. ET/PT on CNN.

In each show, scholars and clergy examine what the Bible tell us about the historical Jesus. The producers combine these discussions with footage of archaeological discoveries of potentially key artifacts and reenactments of notable events during this period.

Archaeology and historical research work fascinate me," says Bishop Carcaño. "I am always open to learning more. It helps to strengthen my biblical scholarship, which helps me with my preaching and my teaching. The archaeological and historical work cause us to stop and reflect on Scripture in a different way."

The second season of "Finding Jesus" has attracted good viewership numbers, especially with adults age 18-34. Bishop Carcaño believes that United Methodists can learn a great deal about Jesus' life from the historical research.

In the March 19 episode, "The Boyhood Home of Jesus," she states "The series can make a difference in how we reflect upon Scripture. If in fact this is the boyhood home of Jesus, it would be amazing and wonderful to touch something that Jesus touched. We all have the human tendency to touch, to know more through our senses, but ultimately it is about faith. We need to have a balance between the human need for the tangible and our faith. In this balance, we can feel the indwelling of the Holy Spirit."

During the season of Lent, when we are taking more time to examine our conscience, read more Scripture, and practice acts of kindness and sacrifice, there is value in learning more about the life of

"This series and other archaeological and historical research are tremendous resources for finding Jesus anew," says Carcaño. "We learn more about the day and age in which Jesus grew up, what human suffering he endured. Understanding how Jesus lived can help us know how we should live. It informs us how to be better disciples in this world."

Carcaño provides commentary in three episodes: "Raising Lazarus" (March 12), "The Childhood Home of Jesus" (March 19) and "The Tomb of King Herod" (March 26). Additional episodes in the second season are "The Pilate Stone" (March 5), "The Bones of St. Peter" (April 2), and "Doubting Thomas" (April 9).

"Finding Jesus: Faith, Fact, Forgery" airs Sundays at 9 p.m. ET/PT on CNN.



What does CROP stand for?

When CROP began in 1947 (under the wing of Church World Service, which was founded in 1946), CROP was an acronym for the Christian Rural Overseas Program. Its primary mission was to help Midwest farm families to share their grain with hungry neighbors in post-World War II Europe and Asia.

Today, we've outgrown the acronym but we retain it as the historic name of the program.

Where do CROP Hunger Walk funds go?

CROP Hunger Walks help to support the overall work of Church World Service, particularly grassroots development efforts around the world. In addition, each local CROP Hunger Walk can choose to return up to 25 percent of the funds it raises to hunger-fighting programs in its own community.

CROP Hunger Walks help to provide food and water, as well as resources that empower people to meet their own needs. From seeds and tools to wells and water systems, the key is people working together to identify their own development priorities, their strengths and their needs - something CWS has learned through 70 years of working in partnership around the world.



Thank you, thank you, thank you, to You we belong,


