Christmas comes as usual. As Christmas is over, almost everything about Christmas dies down—only inside the church building we see some diming light of Christmas. Over the last few weeks we have seen Christmas culture

everywhere, but we also have seen much less of the Christmas message. Our church's emphasis on "Keep Christ in Christmas" is an effort to help people understand the meaning of Christmas in the midst of dwindling influence of the Christmas message for the world. The best way to receive Christmas is to practice the message of Christmas in life. With no action, Christmas will be just another holiday.

Faith matters to everyone. It doesn't matter if one practices a specific form of faith or not, or if he or she acknowledges a basic concept of defining faith such as divine being or not. She might deny the existence of divine figure, but she still has a god when she puts her own thought and reason above any other criteria of referencing and reasoning. And in that sense, faith—faith in a different form for her—matters to her. One rings when he says, "To say that truth is only intelligible through reason is a statement of faith."

Christian faith doesn't go against reason and science. Faith goes along with reason; they complement each other. Faith without reason is superstition; reason without faith cannot lead us to see beyond what we see.

Christianity is a faith that is rooted in history, not abstract philosophy, myths, or fictions. Paul clearly put historical fact as the basis of faith when he said, "If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith.... And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins." (1 Corinthians 15:13-17).

Faith is the foundation for our life. As one said, we are called to live, love, and laugh "by faith" in life. As many a people of faith set examples when they went through all kinds of challenges in their lives, we are called to practice faith in life. "The fundamental fact of existence is that this trust in God, this faith, is the firm foundation under everything that makes life worth living. It's our handle on what we can't see. **The act of faith is what distinguished our ancestors, set them above the crowd**" (Hebrews 11:1-2). And only when we truly know whom we believe in, we can live up to the expectations of our Lord.

Our motto for 2018 will be *"Know Jesus, Make Him Known."* Jesus is willing to meet us where we are. But he doesn't want us to stay at where we meet him. He wants us to grow and bear fruits in our faith. Paul challenges and motivates us to do what he did by saying, "But whatever were gains to me I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. What is more, I consider everything a loss because of **the surpassing worth of knowing Christ** Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things... I want to know the Christ..."

Certainly for Paul knowing Christ was surpassing any other human gains. And my new year's resolution, as Paul challenges me, is that I will spend more time getting to know Christ, my personal Savior and friend. I want to invite you to join me in the effort to know Christ personally.

When God sent His Son to us on that first Christmas Eve, He sent us the Truth, the unchanging story that we pass to our families and friends, and from generation to generation.

Jesus is the constant in our lives of constant change. We are refreshed by His Spirit with each retelling of His birth. Thousands of years have passed, and there will be thousands to come. And although we have no idea what our world will be like in the future, we know that Jesus will be the same as He was, is today, and will be forever. Jesus came to us to save us, from the day of His birth and through eternity.

ALBANY BARN: Albany Barn participates in a variety of events both in house at Stage 1 and around the city and Capital Region! We are always looking for energetic, outgoing people to help spread the word about the Barn at these events! The time commitment for events is generally small, consisting of flexible 1-2 hour shifts. Event Staff are usually responsible for answering questions about Albany Barn, assisting in set-up/breakdown as needed, and increasing our community contacts and volunteer base by encouraging people to sign up for our mailing list or as a volunteer. <u>Habitat for Humanity—ReStore:</u> Proceeds from the ReStore help build homes right here in the Capital District. The store is our biggest fundraiser and it is run by a small staff and many dedicated volunteers. ReStore Volunteers assist with managing inventory, picking up donations and helping customers. ReStore Volunteers must be at least 16 years old, and we require parental consent for individuals aged 16-17. The ReStore is located at 70 Fuller Road and is open Tuesday-Saturday. 
