The summer season kicks in at our church as well. Our church events and programs are, relatively, going slower than usual. But it doesn't mean that we are taking a vacation from our faith—our faith journey never stops rolling.

For this July and August newsletter, I want to invite you to think and rethink of the purpose of church again. Regarding the purpose of church, there are core values that we Christians cannot give up, no matter how we perceive our time. The core values are three-pronged and I call them "Three Pillars of the Christian Church."

The first pillar's name is "confessional" and it is based on Peter's confession of Jesus, "[Jesus], you're the Christ, the Messiah, and the Son of the living God." (The Message) These words have been the foundation of our Christian faith and church for two millenniums and it won't be changed. This confession helps us know that our Christian faith is more than ethics or philosophy or anything else. This confession provides us the reason why we gather and worship God.

The second pillar's name is "connectional" and it is based on Jesus' command, "Love your neighbors," and the Apostle John's words, "Everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love" (1 John vs. 7b-8). Get connected and love one another. We are called to love God and love one another in Christ.

Love is connectional and without connection there is no love. God is connectional and personal. God loves us. God is our unlimited source of love. His love tank never runs low. God calls us to follow Jesus' footsteps. He loves us by giving his life for us. Jesus manifested his love, all-giving, all-forgiving, all-embracing, all-accepting love on the cross and we are called to love one another and sent to exercise love as he did.

The third pillar is "commissional." This is based on the Jesus' last command. "**Go** therefore and **make disciples of all nations**, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you." (Matthew vs. 19-20)

It has been frequently called as: "the great Commission." I minted the word "commisonal" based on this verse in order to explain the third pillar of the church. We need to note these are the words he said to disciples when he left his original disciples for good in this world.

This passage has been called "the Great Commission" by many Christians. Each Sunday Jesus calls us to gather and entrust us with the mission to go and make disciples of Jesus Christ. When we leave the church door, we are sent out to the world to live as disciples of Jesus and to make disciples of Jesus in life.

These three pillars sustain our Christian faith and church and we cannot remove any of these pillars for any reasons if we want to remain a Christian church. We love God and my on-going prayer is that our church becomes and remains as a Christian church, robustly sustained by these three pillars no matter how our society is changing.

My prayer is with you all for a great summer in Christ our Lord.

THOUGHTS FROM THE LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

At the May 17, 2016 meeting of the Leadership Council, chairperson Paul Krekeler challenged all present to reflect on three questions: Why do we need Jesus? Why do we need a church? Why do we need our church? These questions are key, tough, and pertinent, both in our individual lives and in the life of the Christian congregation known as McKownville United Methodist Church. The congregation is invited to reflect on these questions and to consider possible responses that might improve our personal and congregational life. We are planted at the corner of Western Avenue and Church Road. We don't move. But thousands of persons pass by each day, morning and evening, daytime and nighttime. Do we make any impact on any of them? Could any of them become faithful and enthusiastic members if we invited them? Three more questions come to mind: How is McK UMC unique? Why should someone choose us? Why does anyone need us? Are we different from Christ the King RC church west of us, or Christ Lutheran Church east of us, or Pine Grove Methodist Church north of us? Should people stop because of our large parking lot, our sparkling conversation, or our music? How does anyone know about these things? So a major challenge to us all is this: What will attract new members? What strengths do we have to bring in persons ripe for becoming disciples? And what about all those persons who come here sometime during the week for fellowship other than at worship? Wait! Did I hear someone say that getting new members is the pastor's job? Or Leadership Council? Or custodian? Sorry, all members of Christ's church are on the membership committee!

The leadership Council invites each member to contemplate these matters, to share concerns with



family and friends, and then bring ideas on how to meet these challenges as an ice-breaker at fellowship after worship!

Beyond McKownville Church

McKownville Church is beginning a new fiscal year. This year's budget, which assumes full support by our members, will pay church staff, keep up facilities, enable education of youth and adults, and enhance our worship through music. These activities help us. A small part of our formal budget goes beyond McKownville Church, through our Ministry Shares (formerly, apportionments), to be our hands in a hurting world. Moreover, we as a church support other local and world-wide charities that are not a part of our budget. In the fiscal year just ended, we gave \$404 to Conference Specials, \$520 to Africa University, and \$863 to Campus Ministries. Pumpkin sales provided funds to send Darci Leizer. Doug Arnott. and Alex Burns on mission trips. We are a generous church. Conflict and natural disaster don't come on a schedule. They seem to happen at un-opportune times. Once such an event occurs, the response must be quick and enough. The United Methodist Committee on Relief, UMCOR, brings God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by war, conflict, or natural disaster. UMCOR provides humanitarian relief and disaster response to people in more than 80 countries, including the United States. Even after a crisis has passed and attention has faded, UMCOR continues to provide survivors both immediate relief and long-term education, training, and support. McKownville Church has a history of responding quickly and generously to UMCOR needs. Special offerings can be made to UMCOR at any time. Write your check to "McKownville UMC" and put on the memo line the specific purpose (ex: Haiti earthquake). UMCOR is the most cost-effective way to respond to a crisis, because ALL of your contribution goes to the designated work; the cost of office overhead is carried by the general church through ministry sharing. Special offerings on designated Sundays enable United Methodist to share the love of Jesus Christ with God's people everywhere. General Conference has designated these Special Sundays: Human Relations Day One Great Hour of Sharing Native American Ministries Peace with Justice Sunday World Communion Sunday United Methodist Student Day Upper New York Conference has four Special Sundays: Christian Education, Golden Cross, Rural Life, Disability Awareness. To support these causes, use the special offering envelopes found in the bulletin or put a check in the offering plate any time. Be sure to

note in the memo section the purpose you intend.

Guilderland Food Pantry is a very important service right here where we live and worship. Contributions of food may be left at any time in the collection box in the rear left of the sanctuary. These are non-perishable items such as canned fruits or vegetables, peanut butter, pasta, or cereal. For monetary contributions, put a check in the offering (memo: "food bank").

Young people. Television, magazines, and social media are full of negative messages every day about young adults and their role in the larger community. In the midst of all this "bad news", **Cornerstone Campus**

Ministry is a "good news" story influencing the lives of countless young people who attend the University at Albany. Cornerstone Protestant Campus Ministry SUNY (Chapel House Interfaith Center), an interfaith ministry to students, has been supported for many years by our Upper New York Conference. But in 2016 this support went away because of the general shortfall due to Conference member churches not paying full apportionment. That budget cut meant a \$10,000 loss for Cornerstone Campus Ministry in 2016. In order to keep this program alive and well, they need help! College students may have a lot of energy, enthusiasm, ideas and insights, but they don't have much money. Following advice from the Upper New York Conference, they are reaching out to local congregations to ask for help! You can make a designated gift with a check in the offering plate (memo: "campus ministry"). Moreover, twice a year members of Cornerstone visit McKownville Church, bringing with them home made pastries. Welcome them and buy a goody! Follow them on Facebook: Cornerstone Campus Ministry. AND! There is a nonmonetary need that you can support. Recent magazines that you no longer wish to

keep can be recycled by donation to a local hospital. Leave them in the box at the left rear of the sanctuary. You might want to remove your name before you leave them. All these are needs beyond our local church budget. Your support is beyond your annual pledge to support McKownville Church. The need is great, be generous!

HISTORICAL NOTE:

Youth Meet at McKownville

May 12, 1911 weekly Altamont News **McKownville - M.E. Church** Notes. At a meeting of the *Young Peoples's Society* of the church held last Monday evening at the home of Miss Edna Garrison, the constitution was adopted and the report of the committee accepted. "**Delta Chi Rho**" was selected as the name of the society. About twenty were present and an enjoyable evening was spent. The next meeting will be held at 8:30 p.m., May 22, in the church, immediately adjoining the adjournment of the congregational meeting. [By 1921 the Delta Chi Rho society had disorganized but twenty members met to entertain a visiting former member.]

Fri., July 29, 1921 McKownville - Ten delegates from our **Epworth League** will start for Riverside Institute in the Adirondacks on Saturday morning. Before the week is over it is expected that there will be several more in attendance. [The Epworth League was a co-ed *young people's service organization* within the national Methodist Episcopal Church from 1890 until 1940. Epworth League members started as young as ages 10-12 in the Junior Division and could belong to the Senior League until they were adults aged 18-34. With the 1939 unification of the northern and southern branches of the Methodist Episcopal churches with the Methodist Protestant church, the Epworth League was renamed the *Methodist Youth Fellowship* (MYF) and membership was for youth aged 12-24.]

Fri., March 6, 1925 McKownville - The officers elected at the **Sunday School class meeting of Mrs. Lyman's**, on Washington's birthday were: President, Maude Abrams, vice president, Marion Allanson, secretary, Emma Winne, treasurer, Jeanette Momberger. [Sunday School classes then were single sex.] The **Sunday School class of Miss Myrtle Abrams** will hold its regular meeting Saturday at the home of Helen Manville on Fairlawn avenue. The officers elected at the last meeting were: President, Libbie Johnson; secretary, Nina Johnston; treasurer, Helen Manville.

March 1928 to about 1952/53 existed the **Sunshine Class**, a teenager women/young adult group at the McKownville Methodist Church. The group contributed to church projects by putting on plays and

musicals. Susan Barre (nee Allanson) told: ... in March 1928 a small group of Sunday School girls ... voted to pay \$.10 a month dues. This we did until 1943 when most of the members were either working or married and we felt financially able to pay more, so we raised our dues to \$.25 a month to replenish our treasury.

Friday, April 23, 1965 McKownville - Saturday, April 24th: 10 a.m. **Junior High MYF** officers will meet. Sunday, April 25th: 6 p.m. **Senior High MYF** will meet at the parsonage with the Warners [pastor].

This book by C.S. Lewis is considered by many to be a Christian classic. In this eight-session video group study, you will discover why "Mere Christianity" by C.S. Lewis is one of the most read and beloved Christian books of all time. But 70 years later from when it was first delivered on radio, what relevance does it have to our world today? Host Eric Metaxas and a variety of Christian leaders (e.g. N.T. Wright, Tim Keller, Lauren Winner, Devin Brown, Paul McCusker, Douglas Gresham) help us understand the timeless message of C.S. Lewis in fresh ways for a new generation. The first purpose of this video study is to explore the positive ideas that C.S. Lewis has so eloquently written about in "Mere Christianity" for those who already call themselves Christian. The second purpose is to explain in an engaging, winsome and non-threatening way the basic tenants of the Christian faith as illustrated by C.S. Lewis to those who do not claim to be Christian. This study aims to fulfill the vision of C.S. Lewis of reaching people from all faith backgrounds.



It is a mission which has brought us closer to God's hoped for community where all are sisters and brothers."

Emily Burns and Arthur Stott have been chosen to participate in this year's Mission of Peace team going to Nicaragua December 28, 2016-January 10, 2017. To be considered for the trip, each of them needed to submit an essay describing their activities in their local, district, conference, or general church, their travel experience



as it pertains to Mission of Peace, school activities and submit 3 references. Then they were interviewed by a committee.

Emily and Arthur were chose from youth from the Northeast Jurisdictional which consists of annual conferences of...Baltimore-Washington, Eastern Pennsylvania, Western Pennsylvania, Greater New Jersey, New England, New York, Peninsula-Delaware, Susquehanna, Upper New York and West Virginia

This year's Mission of Peace team consists of 12 youth, 9 are from Upper New York Conference (including 4 from the Albany area), 2 from West Virginia and 1 from Western Pennsylvania. Emily and Arthur have both been given money from the Mission Scholarship fund that our church offers from the pumpkin sales, to help offset the costs of the trip, they still need to raise more money. The youth who represent the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the Northeastern Jurisdiction must raise the money which supports their MOP. In the spirit of Shalom, Emily and Arthur humbly ask for individuals prayerful consideration of a monetary gift to Mission of Peace participants through supporting future fundraisers. Look for future fundraisers that Emily and Arthur will plan in the coming months to prepare for this life changing experience.

The Voice of the Martyrs is a non-profit, interdenominational organization working with Christians around the world being persecuted for their faith in Christ. There are prisoners in Islamic Republic of Iran, Kazakhstan, China, Egypt, Uzbekistan, Pakistan, Eritrea, all arrested because they were Christians and showing their faith.

VOM's five main purposes are based on Hebrews 13:3.

Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering.

They are:

- To encourage and empower Christians to fulfill the Great Commission in areas of the world where they are persecuted for their involvement in propagating the gospel of Jesus Christ. We accomplish this by providing Bibles, literature, radio broadcasts, and other forms of aid.
- 2. To give relief to the families of Christian martyrs in these areas of the world.
- 3. To equip local Christians to win to Christ those persecutors who are opposed to the gospel in countries where believers are actively persecuted for their Christian witness.
- 4. To undertake projects of encouragement, helping believers rebuild their lives and Christian witness in countries that have formerly suffered Communist oppression.


To emphasize the fellowship of all believers by informing the world of atrocities committed against Christians and by remembering their courage and faith.



FACILITATOR

Brian Greenwald Born and raised in the Jamestown, NY area, and attended the Evangelical United Brethren (EUB) Church which merged with the Methodist Church to become the United Methodist Church. After graduating from High School, I earned a B.S. degree in chemistry from R.I.T. in Rochester, NY Since retiring, I have been volunteering in many construction projects locally with UMVIM and Habitat for Humanity, and made 3 trips to Haiti on construction teams. My first mission trip was to Gulfport, after Katrina, on a rebuilding trip where I learned about ERT. I have since participated in ERT work in Gowanda, Middleburgh, Bin hamton, Appalachin, Oneida, Westfield, NY, Logan, WVA, Hackleburg, Alabama, and a number ofrebuilding trips to Camp Findley, and Endicott, NY. In 2012, I attended a Train the Trainer class and became an UMCOR certified ERT trainer, and have since trained about 180 ERTs. And, just for fun, during the winter months, I serve as a volunteer on the Safety Patrol at Holiday Valley Ski Resort.

What does an ERT do?

Early Responders are trained to assist survivors of natural disasters such as hurricanes, tornados, and floods. Our main purpose is to bring the presence of Jesus Christ and the UMC to people who are hurting. We become the feet and hands of Jesus, bringing love in action at a time when they are feeling helpless, overwhelmed, exhausted, confused and lost.



Tea leaves and gossip


Too hot a day for me Sitting on bet with a fan blowing 'cross my feet The first cricket sings
