Our conference's Newsletter, issued in this past June, features "prayer." It is quite eye-opening to me considering prayer has been a rare subject for most mainline denominations for long. It also has not frequently drawn attention from people even though it has been explained as a premiere way of practicing our Christian faith both in the Bible and in the Chris-

tian history. I welcomed this new emphasis on Christian practice as a positive sign to going back to the basics of faith journey.

We Christians are called to pray and so we pray. Prayer can be defined and explained with many ways and words, but it can be best defined as a time we intentionally spend time with God, I think. Prayer should be brought in our faith journey in diverse aspects of ministry. And we both as a church and as an individual Christian need to make efforts to become a praying Christian and church.

Here, there is one particular thing I want to mention and it is the ministry of Prayer Boxes we started about two months ago. We started putting boxes at two different locations—I really appreciate Emma Herendeen for this ministry—and it has drawn attention from outsiders. As we know, many recovery-oriented groups are regularly met in our church and people from those groups use the prayer boxes to ask us for prayer.

I put prayer at the center both in my life and in our ministry, even though I often failed to do so. I hear some Christians of saying that if they don't pray, they feel guilty. If they feel they fail praying enough for a few days, their hearts go empty.

Certainly prayer is both joyous and toilsome, both exciting and tedious. And so I know I need to intentionally invest time for prayer. Prayer is a matter of time commitment. And summer is good time to start making prayer a serious part of our spiritual journey.

We are products of culture and society. No one is fully freed or separated from the society and its making. As Aristotle, as an ancient Greek Philosopher said, we cannot deny that we are political animal, products of our own culture. And so is right with a religious scholar Elisabeth T. Vasko when she writes, "To be human is to be a person in relation." And it is this social and existential relationality that ties us to, and implicates us in the life of others. It is inevitable reality but we can control the level of influence by adopting and applying principles of Jesus Christ to our lives.

The mosaic image of Jesus, a vision of our church, is in line with this theological understanding. A striking message of the mosaic image of Jesus is that it cherishes the recognition of diversities and the acceptance of differences. The church is embracing others, different others, both in essence and existence, since God loves the "world" without discrimination and sends his Son to save the" world" without hesitance.

When he says, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Romans 12:2), Paul the Apostle urges us to take the role of actively transforming role than a passively following the dominant social trend no matter it is. We can transform our society by accepting and welcoming differences and diversities, even when they are much different in their appearances and abilities.

Jesus Christ set an example in practicing this principle through his all-embracing, all-giving love in life, culminated on the cross. And this is why Paul urges us to be imitators of him as he became imitator of Jesus. We, as his disciples and followers, are to focus on how we practice love, the love of Jesus, no matter the situation is.

ADULT FORUM LOOKING FOR GUIDANCE!

Adult Forum, our Sunday school for adults, solicits input from members and friends in planning two courses for Fall 2017. Our initial thoughts suggest these will consist of four sessions each but the number of sessions will depend upon interest and may vary.

METHODIST THEOLOGY IN ITS HYMNS:

Methodists love to sing and most of us have a dozen or more favorites. We want to hear from members and friends which hymns are favorites and why. We expect to receive many favorites and likely will cluster together hymns expressing similar thoughts or sentiments. It will be helpful to class leaders if you include hymn title and hymnal number in your response. We are planning to hold these sessions October 2017.

This class will look at some of these "impossible questions" in a Christian context. Perhaps all that we will accomplish is a clarification of the underlying question, but that itself may be comforting. An

example might be: If God is "all good" and God is "all powerful", then why is there evil in the world? This question has been with humanity for thousands of years without resolution. But the question seems worth discussing.

and a season for every activity under the heavens:


- a time to be born and a time to die,
