Mind matters; it always matters. The battle in mind never stops. It surges at some points and declines and surges again and declines. This pattern is fixed with some variants once in a while. So it is not a stretch to say that mind is almost all in our faith journey, for faith is contained in mind.

Faith is, in a sense, the ongoing training of the mind, controlling feelings and emotions. How to free our minds from the prison of mind should be a constant factor to our reality. For instance, when we deal with a touchy and tough situation that seems bigger than us, we easily feel overwhelmed by it and we are often harried by self-pity. Self-pity destroys us like a cancer that eats our souls while self-exaggeration rots other parts of our souls.

We are what we believe. When we are in trouble, we may second guess our faith, what we believe. Believe yourself. Believe what you believe. Believe what you want. The other day in the morning, I was still in bed but wide awake. I was thinking of the day's sermon and asked myself if I truly believe what I believe. Do I believe what I choose? How many times was I startling on a fence between what I believe and what I don't believe? Believe that you can do it. Believe that you want to do it. Believe yourself.

A Christian author writes, "I am what I love," and this resonates with me. As the writer insists, we are products of what we love. Our characters are not fixed but shaped and transformed by what we love and what we seek.

David Brooks, a *New York Times* columnist, in his book, "The Road to Character" explains two different kinds of virtues: resume virtues and eulogy virtues. He explains that resume virtues are the skills we can bring to the market place. The eulogy virtues are the ones that we talk about at a funeral, whether we were kind, brave, honest, or faithful.

Caring is a virtue that we can develop. A caring mind is a necessary Christion virtue. According to phycologists, reaching out to others is a good way to overcome stress. Stress affects our physical condition. It mostly remains as a formidable enemy for our health, but new research suggests that stress may only be bad for us if we believe that to be the case. Psychologist Kelly McGonigal insists that if we see stress as a positive and use it as a tool to reduce stress, reaching out to others will help enormously. During a lecture on mental health, someone once asked Dr. Carl Menninger: "What would you advise a person to do if that person felt a nervous breakdown coming on" Most people thought he would say, "Go see a psychiatrist immediately." but he didn't. Much to everyone's surprise, he replied, "Lock your house, go across the railroad tracks, find somebody in need, and help that person." Take your eye off yourself and your problems and instead develop an "others orientation." To overcome stress or discouragement, do not focus on yourself, but instead get involved in the lives of other people.

CONNECTION? CONFERENCE? MINISTRY SHARES?

United Methodists

Being a Methodist can be exciting and puzzling. You may hear strange words and wonder what they mean: connection, Conference, Ministry Shares. Relax. This short essay will make it almost totally clear!

John Wesley, our founder, recognized the need for an organized system of communication and accountability. He developed the "connexion," a network of classes, societies, and annual conferences. Every local church is linked to an interconnected network of organizations that together join in mission and ministry, accomplishing far more than any one local church or person could alone. At every level, church leaders and members come together in conversation, or conferencing, to discuss important issues and discover God's will for the church. The word "conference" refers to both the assembly and organization of people and the process of discerning God's call together.

The United Methodist Church does not have a central headquarters or a single executive leader. Duties are divided among the General Conference, the Council of Bishops and the Judicial Council.

The General Conference, the primary legislative body of The United Methodist Church, is the only body that speaks officially for the church. It meets every four years to determine legislation affecting connectional matters. Its most recent meeting was May 2016 in Portland, Oregon, US.

The Annual Conference, a more local geographical entity made up of elected lay members and ordained clergy members, is the fundamental body of the church. A Bishop oversees ministry and mission and appoints clergy.

Each local church is part of a District, which is an administrative grouping of churches in a geographic area. As the visible presence of the body of Christ, the local church is the place where members grow in faith and discipleship, putting their faith into action through ministry in the world.

World wide, Conferences are clustered into Jurisdictional Conferences. The Council of Bishops gives spiritual leadership to the entire church connection. A Judicial Council interprets church law.

McKownville Church

We are one of 75 congregations in Albany District. Our District Superintendent is Rev. Rich Weihling, our District office is in Newtonville.

We belong to Upper New York Annual Conference. In 2015, we were 160,038 members, 951 churches, 12 Districts, and a budget of about \$8 million. Our Bishop is Rev. Mark Webb. The Conference office is in Syracuse.

It takes resources, called Ministry Shares, to maintain connection. Each Conference prepares a budget, which is supported by assessing each member church annually on a pro rata basis. This assessment takes into consideration the budget of the local church but not debt payments. Ministry Shares support health insurance and pension benefits for our pastor, District and Conference staff, outreach and program. For McKownville Church this year, our Ministry Share of about \$35,000 (14% of budget). It is paid monthly.

Each Conference sends General Conference a portion to maintain staff for world wide ministry. The proposed budget for General Conference 2016-2020 is \$603 million. World-wide, United Methodists are about 13 million.

McKownville Church is beginning a new fiscal year. This year's budget will support our church staff, keep up facilities, enable education of youth and adults, and enhance our worship through music. A small part of our budget goes beyond McKownville Church, through our ministry share, to be our hands in a hurting world. But there are other opportunities and we as a church do support them. Watch for that next month!

BATTING 1000!!

We're at the start of another baseball season. Some of us are excited about it, while others may not be interested at all. It's a long season, with each major league team playing 162 games before the best head to the playoffs in October.

Whether we're fans or not, we've all probably heard the saying, "You're batting 1000 today!" That's a compliment, meaning that whatever it is you happen to be doing that day, you're doing it well. If you're a sports fan, particularly a baseball fan, you know that batting 1000 is perfection, that you've gotten a hit every time at bat. Although it sounds great, no one has ever come close to doing it. In fact, the highest career batting average ever is held by the famous Ty Cobb. Ty ended his career with a batting average of .366, and his record still holds today.

Just think of that for a minute, even the best of the best, the player who holds the record and has for decades, got a hit just under 40% of the time, and he's still the best ever! That's not to take away anything from great player that Ty Cobb was, but it goes to show that the perfection of batting 1000 is simply so elusive, that no one has ever come close!

I think we can all relate to that baseball analogy in our own lives as well. We try, we study, we prepare, we give it our best, but batting 1000 is just too much to expect. Thankfully, we know we're all human and we all make mistakes. A strike out now and then and a pop fly here and there are just part of life. We celebrate when we get a hit, and we buckle down and try to do better next time when life throws us a curve ball that we just can't hit.

Fortunately, in our lives, we have Someone who does bat 1000. Just stop and think for a moment of all the times you've relied on Jesus to be there for you and see you through difficult times. When we're at our worst, He's at His best with us. Jesus never lets us down, and always knows what is best for us even when we feel He hasn't heard our prayers. HISTORICAL NOTE:

75 years ago in 1941 was our church's 75th anniversary celebration

The Friday, October 24, 1941 Knickerbocker News reported on the seventy-five years of McKownville Methodist Church being celebrated the coming Sunday and also on two long-term prominent church members. (The Knickerbocker News was the Albany evening daily newspaper which later merged with the morning Times Union.)

Formed Before Civil War "The church was organized prior to the Civil War, when



McKownville consisted of a group of farms and was part of the town of Guilderland. Sunday School was conducted in the schoolhouse. In 1864 [1865], John McKown, a farmer, presented land for a mission church. Preachers of the Guilderland Methodist [Episcopal] Church conducted services. The first pastor was Hamilton S. Allen."

1898 Church "The church, built in 1898, adjoins the church

house, completed in 1928. Frame buildings, they stand within 100 yards of the original church, built by parishioners in 1866 and now a remodeled house [see above]. Farther west along Western Ave., near the city line, is the original meeting place of McKownville Methodists, formerly a red schoolhouse and now a bungalow occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Valentine [see right]."

Mrs. Ida Manville, organist Mrs. George Manville, a housewife, at first played an instrument in the original 1866 church similar to the *household variety of organ*. Sometime after the 1898 church was built, church officials bought a new organ, its *bellows* pumped by boys as Mrs. Manville played. The 1941 organ, a *re-built one-manual pipe organ*, was installed in 1927 and had an electric pump, which Mrs. Manville thought was a blessing because she had no difficulty keeping on key. Ida was the church organist for 55 years from 1896 until 1951.

Two other organs followed: in 1957 an *electric* Allen organ with vacuum tubes and in 1991 an Allen *digital computer organ* with 41 stops. Now there is a variety of other instruments.

Father Helped Build Church Charles Albright was the only living charter member, age 82 and an Official Board member. Mr. Albright's father helped build the first church, the labor on a voluntary basis. Mr. Albright prides himself on being the first purchaser of clams for the church's first annual clambake 54 years ago. [A 1932-33 directory states this was 1895.] "Clambakes are annual events and persons for miles around, regardless of membership in the church, come to "hear the year's gossip," the Rev. Harry Titus, pastor, explains. When the new church house was built, provision was made in the design of the kitchen and dining room to accommodate the clambake crowds."

CREATING FEMININE HYGIENE KITS


Do you sew or maybe not? Here is an opportunity to help in multiple ways. There will be a day of sewing to create girl hygiene kits. What is that you ask? Days for Girls organization has a mission "Creating a more dignified, free and educated world through access to lasting feminine hygiene solutions."

Per Days for Girls website, in India, 1 in 4 girls drop out of school when they start menstruating. Women menstruate 60 days, or 2 months a year. Days for Girls kits last 2-4 years, which can earn back up to 240 days of opportunity. The kits we make will help girls to stay in school. The cycle of poverty is broken when girls stay in school. www.daysforgirls.org

We will be putting together feminine hygiene kits within the next couple of months. There are two mission trips that will be delivering the kits to needed areas.

Kit Contains:

- 2 one gallon freezer bags zip lock (non-slider)
- 2 shields preloaded
- 6 pads
- 1 wash cloth
- 1 travel size soap
- 2 pair panties
- 1 visual instruction sheet
- 1 drawstring bag to put contents in



If you do not sew and want to help, you could donate a wash cloth, travel size soap, panties or freezer bags. Or you could donate the cotton material or flannel material that is needed to create the pads and shields. There are very specific material instructions for this project.

150th Anniversary Memorial Patio

We are moving forward with the Memorial Patio you have been hearing about for the past few months. As you know, our Church first opened its doors in 1866. Since that time it has been not only a place of Worship and Spirituality, but has provided the opportunity for hundreds of members and area residents to meet on a weekly or monthly basis for dance and yoga classes as well as for Cub and Boy Scouts, Brownies and Girl Scouts. Our Church has been a welcoming, private location, enabling many recovering alcoholics, drug addicts and gamblers to get back on their feet and become, or continue being, productive members of our community. Throughout the past 150 years our Church has been used for showers, weddings and end-of life celebrations. We host a Chicken BBQ twice a year, a Fish Fry and sell Pumpkins each fall. We have hosted Christmas tree sales, roast beef and spaghetti dinners, as well as Lost Radio Rounder's concerts. In addition, our Church is a designated voting/polling location.

Our Church has touched the lives of each and every one of you, as well as many of your friends and neighbors and we hope you will show your support for all the Church has done for you and the Community by purchasing a brick for our Memorial Patio. In the back of the Sanctuary is a sample brick. Each brick is 12" x 12" and can be inscribed with your name or the name of your loved ones either in memory or in honor of their lives. Each brick can hold up to 12 lines with 23 characters.

Each brick costs \$150 and we need to sell 400 bricks to build this Memorial Patio! When considering your purchase, please remember that the message contained within each brick you purchase, whatever it may be, will be enjoyed for generations to come. The Memorial Patio will be built outside the back of the Sanctuary and will always be available for viewing by you, your friends and family, as well as all of your descendants. Think of the smiles your Memorial Patio brick will create when your children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, great-great grandchildren, etc., read your name and message in the future.

We can now go off to the park and then off to visit the zoo


At night in the yard we could light marshmallows or have a barbecue,
