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Pastor's Message

Faith sharing is the most important and challenging ministry in our ministry and personal faith journey. But faith sharing is only one possible way to grow in your faith and relationship with God and others.

Growing in our faith in God is on-going task and goal for every Christian believer. There are many ways to grown in faith. Our commitment to growing in faith should be intentional, focused, and joyful. Only when we put energy, effort, and time into tending our faith, we will grow. Nobody will grow in faith if they don't want to see growth. On the other side, if you really want to see your faith grow, it takes intentional work; focused thought, and joyous celebration.

My desire as a pastor is to see everyone here in our church to take their faith seriously and to be on a continual journey to grow in faith. Here are some ways to grow in faith. There is no secret or short cut or easy way in our faith journey.

Attending worship regularly. We experience the presence of God when we become part of a body of Christ, in other words church. Worship is an opportunity to fully give ourselves to the transforming power of God. We experience of God through gathering and praising and praying God together, through listening to the message proclaimed from the pulpit.

Participating in the Bible study. Without knowing the God who is revealed to us through the Bible we cannot grow in our faith. Learning and growing take place through an intentional, purposeful participation in group study. I want to encourage you to be a part of Adult Forum (Bible Study) on Sunday 9:30 and Monday 7 pm.

Reading the Bible daily. I have observed that many American Christians do not read the Bible. I was also surprised by many American Christians' lack of biblical knowledge. When we read the Bible we develop a clearer picture of who and what God has meant to people of faith in the past and through this God will speak to you today. There are many Bible reading plans (you can find many on the google). I suggest begin by reading the gospel of Matthew or the Psalms.

Praying every day. Being alone with God daily is very important spiritual step in your growing in faith. Prayer is not only a privilege but also a duty, if we want to walk with God through Christ. Prayer is an opportunity to grow in our faith. It is free, easy, and available to all of us at any moment. Open your heart and your mind and listen to God's thought and will for you.

Reading the faith-related books. There are many books that you can read for your faith growth. You can borrow books from our church library or buy books—I very often buy used books through internet book stores—or share books with other Christians.

Sharing faith with others. It is easy to think that only when you know everything about the Bible can you share your faith with others. The Bible is full of heroes who at first weren't even sure God was truly powerful enough to do what he promised. However, time and time again through sharing their faith with others their faith was strengthened and reinforced.

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150th ANNIVERSARY MEMORIAL PATIO

We are moving forward with the Memorial Patio you have been hearing about for the past few months. As you know, our Church first opened its doors in 1866. Since that time it has been not only a place of Worship and Spirituality, but has provided the opportunity for hundreds of members and area residents to meet on a weekly or monthly basis for dance and yoga classes as well as for Cub and Boy Scouts, Brownies and Girl Scouts. Our Church has been a welcoming, private location, enabling many recovering alcoholics, drug addicts and gamblers to get back on their feet and become, or continue being, productive members of our community. Throughout the past 150 years our Church has been used for showers, weddings and end-of life celebrations. We host a Chicken BBQ twice a year, a Fish Fry and sell Pumpkins each fall. We have hosted Christmas tree sales, roast beef and spaghetti dinners, as well as Lost Radio Rounder's concerts. In addition, our Church is a designated voting/polling location.

Our Church has touched the lives of each and every one of you, as well as many of your friends and neighbors and we hope you will show your support for all the Church has done for you and the Community by purchasing a brick for our Memorial Patio. In the back of the Sanctuary is a sample brick and a sign-up sheet. If you previously signed up to purchase a brick, you will be contacted shortly to firm up your order. Each brick is 12" x 12" and can be inscribed with your name or the name of your loved ones either in memory or in honor of their lives. Each brick can hold up to 10 lines with 23 characters.

Each brick costs \$150 and we need to sell 400 bricks to build this Memorial Patio! When considering your purchase, please remember that the message contained within each brick you purchase, whatever it may be, will be enjoyed for generations to come. The Memorial Patio will be built outside the back of the Sanctuary and will always be available for viewing by you, your friends and family, as well as all of your descendants. Think of the smiles your Memorial Patio brick will create when your children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, great-great grandchildren, etc., read your name and message in the future.

If you are interested in creating a memory for generations to come by purchasing one or more bricks, fill out your contact information on the sheet in the back of the sanctuary and you will be contacted to obtain details on your inscription. If you are unable to fill out that form, send an email to Trustee Noreen VanDoren at <u>Norvandoren@yahoo.com</u> with your contact information and she will assist you.

Historical Note:

Church dinners are the constant; food and cost have varied over time.

In McKownville's 1898 church building, the kitchen and dining room were originally in the basement where there was also a stage. A recipe for *Manhattan Clam Chowder* noted as used by the Women's Society of Christian Society about <u>1880</u> was included in the 1996 **McKownville's Time Old Recipes** cook book. The recipe used 200 clams, ground onions, ground carrots, diced celery, diced potatoes, salt pork (two pounds), and tomato soup and made 40 quarts.

Early days featured meals at prices unimaginable today. In McKownville, the Ladies' Sewing society held a Thursday and Friday evening sale and supper (25ϕ) in November <u>1894</u>, a benefit *oyster supper* was held at a home near the Western Avenue toll gate in February <u>1896</u>, a *clam bake* was held a Wednesday evening in September <u>1898</u> on the church grounds for 50ϕ , and the "Memorial M.E. church" ladies held a Holiday Festival and sale with supper (25ϕ) in the basement and Sunday school room of the church [old section] a Wednesday evening in November <u>1899</u>. In March <u>1909</u> the price of admission to a *hot chicken supper* and entertainment held by the ladies in the McKownville church on a Thursday evening was 35ϕ .

In March <u>1928</u> a *fish supper* was served by the ladies of the M.E. church Friday evening from 6:30 to 8 o'clock for 50ϕ . The menu of homemade food was: Codfish croquettes, tomato sauce, escalloped potatoes, tuna and macaroni salad, baked beans, hot buttered beets, pickles, rolls and butter, cakes, jello, coffee. There were also *turkey dinners* in the 1940's.

Louise Vedder who joined the church in 1920 wrote on the **clam bakes** as did Bill Seim who worked on them as a young boy in the early 1940's. We really begged for two weeks before the clambake. Many non-members contributed to these affairs. The day before the clambake we spent at the church setting tables, cleaning chicken, seasoning and wrapping it in cheesecloth; washing clams in a barrel with a crank on it, or in a water bucket; and husking corn. Then on Saturday we made three pies per person, and went to church and served three clambakes with 2-hour intervals between each bake to wash dishes and set up tables – and we always sold out. We came home exhausted but with money in our treasury. We used to serve all the chicken and clams they wished, till we found out they were bringing bags and filling them to take home for their Sunday dinner.

In the <u>1930's</u> the men cleaned about 3000 clams (in 1930 was 6000 plus 300 chickens) in back of the old church and the women were busy in the kitchen fixing the corn and the potatoes, wrapping each individual dinner or "bake" in cheese cloth. The clams were wrapped separately with about a dozen clams in a bunch. When all was ready the 150 bakes were put into the steamer set on concrete blocks. A large white potato was put on top. This was the tester as to when the whole steamer full of food would be ready to serve. It took at least two hours for everything to cook. When it was time to serve, the fire was put out and the individual dinners and packages of clams were removed and passed through the small windows of the kitchen to the women inside who then served the dinners to the people who were eagerly awaiting their food in the dining room. The clambake price in fall 1933 was \$1.50 for adults and 75ϕ for children.

The remodeling finished in 1986 of the old church section moved the kitchen and dining upstairs. For many years the men ran *roast beef dinners*. Now *chicken barbeques* catered by Brooks' Barbeque of Oneonta are offered twice a year. Also, the youth have sponsored *Lenten fish fries*.
