From the Pastor...

Our society has been so much polarized and recently we have been witnessing even more heightened divisions, hatred, violent expressions of opinions. Tribalism, factionalism prevails not only in the political arena, but also in religious community.

This trend of negativism appears and affects almost

every nook and cranny of life. And accordingly we become more inclined to approach difference and diversity with the toll devoid of empathy and acceptance, driven by false beliefs and selfish claims. In the Christian church this trend also has gone so deep and it has hurt and harmed many aspects of faith. And the wounds are so painful and it seems incurable.

This sense of our reality poses great questions on who we are as a nation and as a church. We are urged to discover and recover Christian values seriously. Positive and constructive solutions to the challenges we face now are needed more than any time and the church should lead in this struggle and effort. But finding how to reconcile differences and disparities in a given situation very often remains as a daunting task. This is why we are tempted to duck and dodge rather than tackle and solve conflicts and disparity.

Certainly we try learning from history, from our own mistakes and failures, but it seems that we foolishly repeat those negative experiences again and again. However, we cannot allow this ugly reality to discourage and dissuade us from finding answers to problems and challenges that we face now.

We Christians learn from Jesus, how he handled divisions and differences. For him empathy was the answer to overcoming obstacles derived from differences and disparities. Empathy came from the Greek word *empathia*, two words meaning "in" and "feeling." Empathy is the ability to understand and share the feelings of others.

Jesus showed a great sense of empathy for people, especially for the socially marginalized people, who were hated and rejected by their society. He saw broken souls in them and had empathy for them. He not only had accepted them, but he also became their friends. Empathy is the virtue that we Christians keep and maintain in the face of differences and disparities. Empathy is a vital part of our call to ministry. We are moved to ministry when we allow our hearts to break with the things or situations that break the heart of God.

We Christians are called to be moral compass in life. God calls us to be prophetic when our societies go wrong morally and socially. When we falter and fail in embracing differences and disparities, we stop being followers of Jesus Christ. Faith devoid of empathy is not Christian value.

Time and again, we Christians cannot allow hate and violence seep through and soil our souls. We can set an example by inspiring and scaling the best of what is in our faith community what is so clearly on display.

We see pains, sufferings, and brokenness, caused by hate and violence, around us as well as far from us in our planet. We are often tempted to avoid those situations. We have inclination not be bothered or get involved. But for ministry of the Kingdom to happen, we are called to engage ourselves in. If we listen to the voice of God, we need to take a risk to be vulnerable to be sensitive to the call of God to action.

Certainly differences or disparities will be there and can block our ways as we have seen many times in history. They will cause discord and dissonance in society. But we can overcome conflicts and frictions caused by differences and disparities, not by denying or rejecting but recognizing and embracing with empathy. When we are willing to follow Jesus' footstep, we will know that differences and disparities are rather blessings, not obstacles for unity and harmony, for peace and happiness.

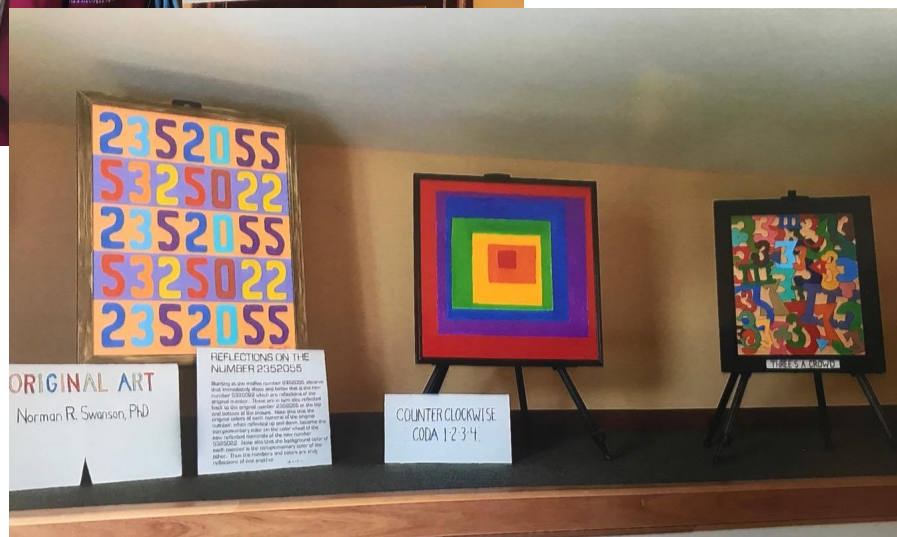


Paintings by Norman Swanson

Below are some church memories on the patio bricks.

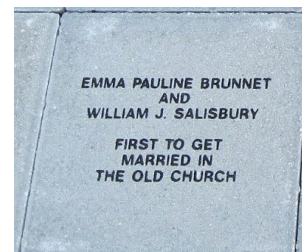

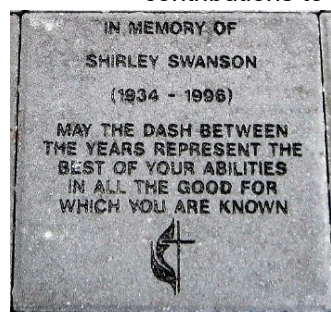

WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY

World Communion Sunday (OCTOBER 1st) offers congregations a distinctive opportunity to experience Holy Communion in the context of the global community of faith. The first Sunday of October has become a time when Christians in every culture break bread and pour the cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church. On that day, they remember that they are part of the whole body of believers. Whether shared in a grand cathedral, a mud hut, outside on a hilltop, in a meetinghouse, or in a storefront, Christians celebrate the communion liturgy in as many ways as there are congregations. World Communion Sunday can be both a profound worship experience and a time for learning more about our wider community of faith.

As one of the special Sundays authorized by the General Conference, World Communion Sunday is to be observed with the taking of an offering throughout the denomination. World Communion Sunday is observed the first Sunday in October. The observance focuses the attention of United Methodists on the universal and inclusive nature of the church. One half of the proceeds from the offering is for World Communion Sunday Scholars administered by the General Board of Global Ministries. The remaining one half is to be used for the Ethnic Scholarship Program and the Ethnic In-Service Training Program, which are administered by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

Around the globe, countless gifted and qualified people face financial obstacles that hinder them from preparing for the vocation God has given them, especially youth and young adults. For ethnic students who will be the first generation in their families to attend college, or for those people of color who haven't historically had access to resources that make higher education possible, the road toward education has often been unwieldy.

What would it look like if the church today imitated Jesus' affirmation of the full dignity and God-given potential of all women and men—especially those who've historically been assigned to the world's margins? On World Communion Sunday your giving helps to provide scholarships for national and international graduate students whom God has gifted to learn and to serve.

Equipping Disciples Like Mary Grace to Serve in Jesus' Name

As a small child Mary Grace Galapon labored as a housemaid in exchange for food and clothing. Yet, allowed to attend church, she found hope. As a member of The United Methodist Church, your giving on World Communion Sunday has allowed this deaconess, of the Mindanao Philippines Annual Conference, to pursue an education that is now changing her community as she works to eliminate poverty.

Mary Grace's work, and the impact of hundreds more like her, are possible because you give.

Will You Equip World-Changers?

Will you give generously on World Communion Sunday to make education and vocational impact possible for more students, like Mary Grace? Will you equip gifted and qualified students from around the globe to become the world-changers God created them to be?

Nelson Mandela said, "Education is the most powerful weapon you can use to change the world." And because the people of The United Methodist Church believe that all of God's children have been created and gifted to build the kingdom Jesus ushered in, we're resourcing them to do just that. Pumpkin Fundraiser

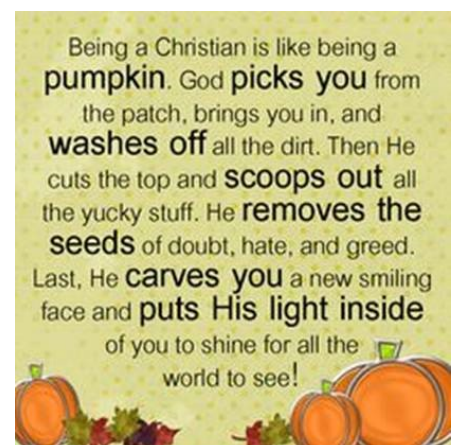
McKownville's Pumpkin Patch is so much more than a fundraiser. It is a site to bring the community together. It is a mission to serve the Navajo's who grow them and the independent truckers who deliver them. It provides scholarship money to support those traveling for mission work. Support of this project is in your hands – work for just 1 hour, or many; work in the patch and interact with visitors (invite them inside for worship or activities); work behind the scenes with publicity, patch design, or volunteer coordinating; be creative and help our patch grow!

Pumpkin Patch Sitters: - if you are able to sit for 2-3 hour shifts during the month of October either one time or on a regular shift, a sign up calendar will be available in the sanctuary foyer and online through Google Calendars. If you have not volunteered with us before or need a refresher using the Square for credit card sales, see Angela Stott for a brief instructional review.

Pumpkin Pies! Pumpkins are more fragile than one would think and regularly get bruised or broken in the patch so that they cannot be sold. But waste not want not! We take these broken pumpkins and clean them and cook them to be made into Pumpkin Pies! These pies are given to the Capital City Rescue Mission to be served for Thanksgiving. If you have some time and a stove, please contact Angela or James Stott to get a pumpkin or two to turn into puree!

NEW THIS YEAR!!! Carving Contest!!! The rules are simple, to be eligible your pumpkin must have been purchased from one of our partner patches. We will provide you with contest stickers to pass out with the sale of each pumpkin as proof of purchase. We will provide flyers to pass out to customers that explain step by step how to enter the contest. We have made banners for you to hang in front of your patch. They will come complete with metal stakes and bungee cords to hang them. To enter, customers will take a picture of their carved pumpkin and upload it to the contest gallery at Facebook.com/carvingcontest. The contest sticker must be present in the picture; without the sticker the entry will be disqualified. Once submitted they will be given a link where they can share their jack-o-lantern and ask friends to vote. We will not pick the winner. The winner will be chosen by Facebook votes. A contest photo gallery will display all the entry's and automatically order the pictures based on who is currently in the lead. Each Facebook user can vote once. Everyone is eligible to enter including patch volunteers and church members. Anyone with an IP address outside the US will be automatically blocked from entering as a precaution to prevent fraudulent entries. There will also be a \$1,000 dollar prize to the organization that sells the winning pumpkin. Entries will be accepted beginning September 1st and ending November 1st at 11:59pm EST. The winner will be announced the following day.

Clean up Day: November 1st the last of the pumpkins will need to be moved forward to the edge of the lawn, the tent will need to be taken down. The tables cleaned and re-turned inside. The decorations stored away until next year. And the pallets brought back to the back parking lot area near the shed.

There is a collection of items for flood buckets underway. Below are a list of items that go in each flood bucket. You can donate all or part of the items, or money to purchase items, for the next couple of weeks at church. There will be a display in the back of the church to place all donations. Then on Saturday, October 21st at 10:00am come and help assemble the buckets. If you have any questions, please contact Darcianne Leizer.

Cleaning Kit Materials

- 15 Gallon "Round" bucket with resealable lid
 - Buckets from fast-food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned
 - Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner
 - Advertisements on the outside are acceptable
 - No square buckets
 - (Only round buckets are used to ensure proper stacking during transport)
- Liquid laundry detergent
 - One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) only
- Liquid household cleaner
 - 12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water
 - No spray cleaners
- Dish soap
 - 16-28 oz. bottle, any brand
- 50 Clothespins
- Clothesline
 - One 100-ft. or two 50-ft. lines
 - Cotton or plastic
- 7 Sponges
 - No cellulose sponges due to mold issues
 - Remove from packaging
- 24-Roll heavy-duty trash bags
 - 33-45 gallon sizes
 - Remove from the box
- 18 Cleaning wipes
 - Handi-wipes or reusable wipes
 - No terry cleaning towels
 - Remove from packaging
- 1 Can air freshener
 - Aerosol or pump
- 1 Insect-repellant spray
 - 6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover

- 2 Pairs kitchen dishwashing gloves
 - Should be durable enough for multiple uses
 - from packaging
- 1 Pair work gloves
 - All Cotton

- 5 Scouring pads
 - Remove from wrapper
 - No stainless steel, Brillo pads or SOS pads (nothing with soap built in)
- 1 Scrub brush
 - Plastic or wood handle
- 5 Dust masks

Important Notes:

- All items must be new except for the actual bucket and lid.
- All cleaning agents must be liquid and in plastic containers. No powders, please.
- If you cannot find the requested size of a liquid item, use a smaller size. Including larger sizes of any item will prevent the lid from sealing.
