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September is coming soon and kids will go back to school and our church also will regain the energetic rhythm and pattern of ministry and activity after a long rest and preparation for a new year. I am with great excitement and expectation envisioning a great year for our church for many reasons. Our worship services, both traditional one and contemporary praise one, will give people more enhanced opportunities to experience God and people will be finding life's meaning and direction through being parts of worships. And our children's ministry and youth group will generate and give more energy and motivations to both children and youth in learning and growing in their faith, character and relationship with God. And our diverse ministry and mission opportunities, both local and global, will enlarge the kingdom of God through faithful and energetic taking initiatives and taking active parts in them.

And there will be many more reasons for the positive envisioning of our church and all these will come true through our faith and faithfulness to the fundamental and intrinsic purposes of church.

We are faith a community grounded, guided, and guarded above all by the Bible and its teachings. We in the Bible see three major pillars on which we the church need to stand: confessional, connectional, and commissional. Christian church is based on Peter's confession of Jesus Christ (Matthew 16:16), and we affirm it whenever we gather together. And the New Commandments that Jesus gave us are the foundations of our ministry and mission (love God and love neighbor). And Jesus last command to us, making disciples of Christ to the ends of the earth, is the center in our mission and life in the world. We are called to make disciples through living as Jesus' disciples.

The third pillar, commissional (Jesus' last command), needs to take our attention and action more. Our immediate intention and attention should be on this instrumental ministry.

One of several tools to assess and measure being a faithful church to Jesus' command is asking how much efforts and energy we put on inviting people into the relationship with God in Jesus Christ. The fruitfulness of ministry often depends on how effectively we use trend of our society. In terms of inviting people, the fall is important, because more people tend to come back to church during this period of time. This is why the months from September till December have been known as "Harvest Months" among church growth and leadership teachers. Traditionally more people tend to come back to church because their awareness of need of faith and willingness to get involved in the local church go up. And so churches are encouraged to boost more tools and opportunities to draw those people to church this period of time of the year.

Inviting people into the relationship is intrinsic in being a church faithful to Jesus' command. In his conversation with his disciples Jesus said, "My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to finish his work. Do you not say, 'Four months more and then the harvest'? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the field! They are ripe for harvest. Even now the reaper draws his wages, even now he harvests the crop for eternal life, so that the sower and the reaper may be glad together. Thus the saying 'One sows and another reaps' is true. I sent you to reap what you have not worked for. Others have done the hard work, and you have reaped the benefits of their labor" (John, 4: 34-38).

As we are told, in the Bible, that a town of Samaritans entirely came to the relationship with Jesus Christ because of a woman's witness and invitation, we are called to invite people into the relationship with God in Christ Jesus, for a new life, for a new being (faith and character), for a new relationship.... I am envisioning here again what God will do for us and through us for the people in our area. And I believe that all these visions will be coming to us according to how we respond to the visions and take actions.

HISTORICAL NOTE:

Men at McKownville

The men of the McKownville church do a lot of church work (as do the women). The men also met socially, played together, and sponsored other groups.

Fri., March 2, 1928 in weekly Altamont News McKownville (omitted last week) -

... Invitations are out for the Father and Son banquet to be held at the McKownville M. E. church, Friday evening, March 2nd. There will be several addresses by members of the Sunday school. The principal speaker of the evening will be Rev. Howard C. Ackley of Trinity M. E. church of Schenectady. Harry France will serve as toastmaster.

Friday, March 25, 1932 McKownville -

.... The regular Every Member canvas has been going on for the past two weeks and the canvassers will report March 21 at 7:30 the results.

Horse shoe pitching has become very popular with the men of the McKownville M. E. church. Last week a crowd attended there being about 10 teams. Some fine scores and many ringers were made. Clarence Albright, Rev. George Robinson, Gordon Pearle and Harry France were high. This Monday evening a much larger crowd is expected. After the game coffee and dough nuts will be served by Nicholas Crouse and Milo Clark.

After the 1954 twenty-three acre land purchase, the Kiwanis group met at the church for dinner meetings and the W.S.C.S. served an average of 40 men each week from 1954 - 1957. The ladies took on this project to enable them to pay their pledge of \$2,000 to help buy the land.

1965 McKownville Methodist - Rev. Charles J. Warner and Rev. Ralton M. Speers, ministers. [Saturday, May 2 was a farewell reception for Rev. Warner & his family at church.]

In <u>1974</u> Methodist Men were *sponsoring Boy Scout Troop 82* which met Tuesday evenings in the auditorium *and a Little League baseball team*. Their major fund raiser was a roast beef dinner in May. (Later the dinners were in November.)

Mission of Peace

The Albany District of the UMC has FOUR youth who have been chosen to be part of the NEJ Mission of Peace Team 2017 to Nicaragua! This speaks loudly to the quality of education, support and leadership that our district and conference provide for our young people.

The Mission of Peace is a yearly journey of discovery and Shalom to nations in our global community sponsored by the Northeast Jurisdictional Council on Youth Ministries of the United Methodist Church. Each year, every Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church in the Northeastern Jurisdiction may select up to four youth to share in this experience. In the case of vacancies, an annual conference may be allowed additional seats to fill these vacancies. On each MOP, participants worship in churches, meet youth in churches and civic organizations and share with people who have a similar longing for peace and understanding. These times have been the high points of each MOP experience.

The MOP is a life changing experience! It is a journey which leads each participant to discover God's Spirit at work in the world. It is an experience of God's extended family. It is a journey of discovering God's Shalom. It is primarily a people to people experience in which we learn from our hosts how they live as disciples of Jesus Christ in their country. It is a mission which has brought us closer to God's hoped for community where all are sisters and brothers.

Each year the Youth who represent the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the Northeastern Jurisdiction must raise the money which supports their MOP. In the spirit of Shalom, the Jurisdictional and Conference Councils on Youth Ministries or Youth Ministry Teams humbly ask each church, UMW unit, UMM unit, UMY, and individuals for prayerful consideration of a monetary gift to the Conference MOP participants.

Each youth who journeys on the Mission of Peace is expected to share their experience at least five times upon their return. Each MOP'er is looking forward to telling their story of Shalom. They may be contacted individually or through the Conference Youth Coordinator.

Those who have journeyed on the Mission of Peace give thanks to God and to all who have made it possible for us to make this journey. We pray daily for Shalom, for understanding between people, and that there may be the chance that others can journey on a Mission of Peace.

Inspired by the preaching of Bishop Dale White, the Mission of Peace was brought into existence by the Northeastern Jurisdictional Council on Youth Ministries (NEJCYM) Legislative Session at Albright College, July 28-31, 1984. Each year since, the NEJCYM Legislative Session has affirmed the priority of the Mission of Peace in order that new understandings of community and shalom might continue to develop. The MOP has traveled to the USSR (86-88, 90), The People's Republic of China (89, 97, 01, 06, 11, 16), Eastern Europe (91,92), Zimba-bwe (93, 96, 99), Guyana (94), India (95, 00, 05, 10, 15), Nicaragua (98, 03, 07, 12, 17), Brazil (02, 04), Cuba (08, 13), and South Africa (09, 14).



The Pumpkin Patch is a fundraiser to support the Mission Scholarship Fund. We have raised in excess of \$100,000 in Scholarship Money since October 1999. Scholarships are available to youth or adults who wish to volunteer their time as a mission volunteer, because of your support of the Pumpkin Patch. Scholarships usually cover 70% of the cost of the trip, so that the desire to serve is never impeded for financial reasons. Thank you to all who have generously volunteered their spare time in October and loyal purchased their fall pumpkins from our patch!

Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers does good at 5 different levels – Did you know that by supporting our pumpkin patch we:

- Give the Navajo Nation in Farmington, NM consistent agricultural employment and skills that have translated to other agricultural endeavors creating a much more sustainable economy than 25 years ago?
- Give the small independent truckers consistent, reliable work throughout the fall? PPF does not support the conglomerate trucking companies, only the individual truck owners who work independently.
- Keep at least 33% of the money raised by the sale of pumpkins in our scholarship fund as profit, which has supported mission trips to Ireland, Missouri Tornado Relief, Uganda, Nicaragua and so many more?
- Are able to use leftover pumpkins to bake 100 pumpkin pies each year which are donated to the Capital City Rescue Mission for Thanksgiving?
- Are able to support community organizations like St. Anne's, Albany City Schools and the Regional Food Bank with low cost or free pumpkins for the holidays?

Volunteers in Mission team to Nicaragua

~March 2017~

A VIM opportunity in Nicaragua is being planned for late March—early April 2017. The team will work with Accion Medica Christianna (Christian Medical Action/AMC), Our UM missionary, Belinda Forbes, DDS, is our primary contact person. She and her agency, AMC, work with "poorest of the poor" in this beautiful country, which is the second poorest in our hemisphere. The tasks of the team have not yet been determined, but they will include projects that improve the lives of some people in Nicaragua. Possible projects might be construction of a pharmacy or community center, health education, assisting with dental car, or painting a clinic building. Hands-on direct medical care with not be one of the projects. Team members will also have the opportunity to form relationships with the warm, friendly people with whom they work.

The team/s will be jointly sponsored by the Jonesville UMC and First UMC, Schenectady. Details have not yet been determined. There may be options to go for either 10 days or two weeks. Cost will be approximately \$2,000-\$2,500. This amount includes airfare, food, transportation in the country, lodging, translator fees—everything except souvenirs. Scholarship aid is often available.

2. Help Sew one of three parts of the kit drawstring bag (used to hold all the items)





HOW OUR CHURCH BUDGET WORKS!

Leadership Council, in June, approved a budget (summarized below) for our fiscal year July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017. This budget is balanced.

Our church's revenue comes from several sources. 73% comes from members who pledge, 11% from members who give but don't pledge, and 2% anonymous cash in the offering plate. (For most churches, "giving" represents 90% of budget.) About 5% comes from renting space to many groups that meet regularly in our building (AA, NA, Yoga); the Board of Elections uses our social area during elections. Fund raising (our Spring and Fall BBQs) brings in another 5%. And, this year, we will carry-over \$11,000 from last fiscal year, about 4%. This carryover is unusual and unexpected. It arose for three reasons: several unexpected, generous donations of cash and stock near the end of the fiscal year, lower than expected costs for heating and snow removal because of exceptional weather, and not paying our full Ministry Share. There is no "catch-up" for missed Ministry Shares; the unpaid amounts are simply forgiven by the Conference. Leadership Council is committed to full payment this fiscal year and we are on schedule.

Our church's spending pattern is typical of a not-forprofit organization. Let's look at the details.

<u>Staff 48%</u>. About half of our spending is for staff salaries and benefits. We have one pastor, one halftime secretary, one music director, one choir director. We provide benefits required by law (FICA) or the United Methodist Church (pastor pensions, health insurance).

Volunteers 0%. In addition to paid staff, we have many volunteers. The Praise Band, members of the various choirs, teachers, tellers, and each member of our ministry teams contributes time and talent without compensation.

<u>Facilities 28%.</u> All facilities require maintenance and repair. It is nice to be warm in the winter and cool in the summer. The Trustees in recent years have aggressively made changes to cut long term costs. The solar panels on our sanctuary roof generate electricity that offsets utility costs. Lighting in and around our buildings is being upgraded to LEDs that have lower electric demand.

Ministry Share 14%. This is our share of support to programs of the greater United Methodist Church. It pays staff and funds programs of our Upper New York Annual Conference and the world-wide General Conference. Through these parts of our church we are connected around the world, helping others in distant lands about which we know little but which the Church deems worthy of support.

Administration 8%. Each year we publish 11 monthly news letters and print 52 weekly bulletins. To do so takes paper and postage. Many shut-in members rely on the monthly news to stay informed about our church. We also have a web site.

Education and Program 2%. This is our program for ourselves. It is our worship, Sunday School, youth group, senior group, Adult Forum. It is educating the next generation of leaders of McKownville Church. It is attracting new members. It is equipping members to minister to our neighbors. This spending strengthens and refreshes each one of us so we may leave the shelter of the sanctuary and move into the real world, being the hands of Christ to real people facing real problems and hurting in real ways.

That's a short version of where our church's money comes from and how it is spent. Questions? Ask a member of the appropriate Ministry Team.

Back to School Checklist:

A Three-Week Guide

3 weeks before school starts:

- Inventory your child's clothing and sell or give away any items that are too small. Make a list of what he needs before you start <u>shopping for new clothes</u>.
- If you're not already, familiarize yourself with the school's Web site. Many teachers post a school-supply list, welcome note or other information.
- Make a list of the <u>school supplies</u> you'll need to purchase new or replenish, as well as any other necessary items, like backpacks or lunchboxes.
- Gather ads and circulars for back-to-school sales. Form a game plan for which stores you'll hit.
- Review your emergency plan and revise if necessary. Call your emergency contacts to confirm that they can still help if a situation arises (say, can they pick your kids up from school or the bus stop if you can't).

2 weeks before school starts:

- Have a child who's new to middle school? Have her practice with a combination lock. Also, if possible, go to the school and <u>practice changing classes</u>.
- Encourage your child to write down his locker combination, class schedule, room numbers and teachers' names in a planner or agenda. (And double check it.)
- Shop for school supplies and clothes. Use our easy school-shopping guide.
- Confirm after-school child-care arrangements.
- Plan morning, afternoon and evening routines, and involve your kids, whenever possible, in this process. Begin enforcing bedtimes and practice waking up at the same time each day.

1 week before school starts:

- Shop for groceries for next week's school lunches.
- Wash all your child's new school clothes; make sure staples are laundered, too.
- If you haven't already, visit the school with your child for a re-familiarizing walk.
- Show your child his bus stop and go over the plan for getting to and from.
- Ask if your child has any questions or concerns she might want to discuss. Let her know you're available anytime she wants to chat.


The night before the first day of school:
