Recently our country has been engaged in a heated conversation on race relations. Our country

has been racially and culturally more diverse and embracing than most others, but we have witnessed a rise in conflicts over race relations across the nation. Some groups have threatened and expressed their hate for other ethnic groups. It is an alarming sign of moral failing and degradation but this hatred has even spread to Christian groups as well.

I have refrained from speaking about social-political matters in public, because they can quickly become controversial and divisive. But recent alarming and dangerous signs indicate to me that we are at a critical juncture.

America has been a symbol of high moral values and principles for the people of other countries who had to contend with human rights issues. We are called to live as followers of Jesus Christ. A cardinal duty of being Christians is to follow His will and words in life. We are expected to live up to a high moral value. When we confess ourselves as Jesus' followers, it means that we will live the way He taught us to live. He is our model for Christian life, although His standard is high and we often fail in comparison, our failure doesn't mean that we should stop trying to live up to the Christian value that Jesus practiced and set.

As Christians we must not tolerate any hatred toward other races or people. We must not condone any form of hate, violence, and discrimination based on color and racial or cultural backgrounds. When we lose sight of or ignore basic human values, we stop being disciples of Jesus Christ. Our moral, spiritual value should not be compromised for any reason. Paul the Apostle's words to the Christians in Rome two thousand years ago, rings as true now as it did then, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect (Romans 2:2).

What we are witnessing now in our society urges us to think of our own identity as Christians and followers of Jesus Christ. Being a Christian means rejecting, unequivocally, any form of hate-filled words and actions.

John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, set an example for us now how we stand for social justice. He ardently fought social injustice and racial discrimination through his actions as well as his words. Before he died at the age of eighty eight, six days before his death, he wrote a letter to William Wilberforce, a parliament member, who had been fighting for the abolition of slavery in England for many years - unsuccessfully. Wesley had spoken out against slavery, and referred to the salve trade as the "execrable sum of all villainies" and encouraged him to continue the fight for the emancipation of the slaves in England.

Christians are not merely following the pattern of the world, but set the tone for our small world by being a peace-maker not a hate-monger, a harmonizer not divider but

harmonizer. When there are differences in various areas, there will be splits and conflicts too. And we Christians will transform by following Jesus' footstep as Paul the apostle and John Wesley did. We can overcome barriers and obstacles and bring reconciliations and harmony as Jesus did on the cross.

REPORT MISSION TRIP TO ZIMBABWE

Darcianne Leizer and Henry Walter were members of a nine-person team from Upper New York Conference July 15-30 that brought greetings and services to several United Methodist educational institutions in Zimbabwe, Africa. The United Methodist Church and its forerunners have a long history in Africa. First efforts were mission schools and hospitals. There are now 14 mission sites in Zimbabwe that include one or both a school and a hospital. Most recently Methodists were key to establishing the Africa University, a university now ranked 118 out of some 3000 universities and colleges in Africa.

Our flight from JFK airport via Dubai to Harare, capital of Zimbabwe, took 24 hours. To recover from flight fatigue, we crashed at Chivendera Villa.

Tuesday we toured Africa University, met staff and saw library, computer, and agricultural places. By coincidence, a group from Baltimore-Washington conference was visiting Africa University also! At nearby Fairfield Children's Home, an orphanage ages 1 to 18 years, we viewed their meager group homes and met their dedicated house mothers. Then we played field games with the children: Frisbees, soccer, and jump rope.

Wednesday morning we had a short tour of Mutare, stopping at a store with groceries and appliances (have you ever seen a four unit stove with two gas and two electrical?). In the afternoon we visited Ishe Anesu, a Project located within Hilltop United Methodist Church premises in Sakubva, a very poor neighborhood of Mutare. Ishe Anesu is an after-school project with a primary objective to provide education to the underprivileged children orphans and the poorest of the poor. In order to achieve this objective, the project pays school fees and buys school uniforms, books and stationery for the children. Wearing the school uniform is required. The project offers Christian education and values, social and family ethics and recreation. The project provides 2 meals a day. Minor injuries and illnesses that respond to first-aid treatment are taken care of at the Project. The Project pays for doctor appointments and treatment of the children. Students do not live at Ishe Anes; plans for having dormitories are being negotiated with social services/child welfare.

Thursday we drove to Mutambara, a Methodist mission south of Mutare near the Mozambique border. Two key facilities: Mutambara Mission Hospital and Mutambara Public School with grades pre-K through 12. Our main mission task was to paint the interior of

two rooms used by elementary students with hearing or seeing impairment. Upon arrival, we learned we were going to paint the exterior also! Thursday afternoon we scraped walls. Friday, Saturday, and Monday we painted. Most surfaces required three coats of paint, some four. Students, especially the middle school level, liked to watch and engage in short conversations to try out their English language skills. All seemed intrigued by our straight hair.

Sunday church we joined some 300 others in audience-participation worship. John Wesley would have been proud – the singing was lusty! The two hour service did not drag. We were caught up in the enthusiasm.

Our team leaders were Drs. Sylvia and Marvin Reimer, medical missionaries 1999-2001 at Mutambara. They return to Mutambara, leading teams to extend work by prior teams. Dewey and Joni, retired, were on a previous trip; Paul is a second year student at Drew Seminary; Lori and Kristen are special education teachers; Darcianne keeps Albany Med running; Henry is a retired chemist. Elizabeth Cobb traveled with us but spent her time at Fairfield Children's Home with hearing impaired children.

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View from 1915: Some Things Change, Some Don't Pastor's Report

[Wilbur Charles Newell was appointed pastor to Guilderland/McKownville spring 1915 - spring 1919.]

To the 1st Quarterly Conference of <u>McKownville</u> Methodist Episcopal Ch. [Church] held at McKownville Thursday 2:30 PM May 6-1915.

At this end of the charge [other end was Guilderland village] we have passed three good + profitable Sundays, been cordially rec'd by the people and made 12 or 15 calls. Unfortunately hard thunder showers + a call to attend a funeral under sad circumstances in our former parish has kept us from meeting with Delta Chi Ro + the Ep. Lge. [Epworth League] societies of young people - two promising fields to cultivate but we hope to make good all absences + delays by more + better work in the future. Our young people here are surely worth holding + cultivating + once well anchored to the Lord + the Ch. [Church] will in themselves make a strong church in the near to-morrow. Our Sunday School is well managed, well attended + offers a promising field to cultivate. Our S. S. has voted to make a special day of Children's Day in June + has a com. [committee] of all the S.S. teachers to make the program + carry it out. Next Sunday we have announced as Mother's Day with special invitations to mothers to bring their children for baptism. Our special motive is to reach the home + the children.

At McKownville we have a large + sufficient choir for which Mrs. G. A. [Ida] Manville + Mrs. H. S. [Viola] Rapp are largely responsible. Both of these loyal ladies having wrought successfully realizing the extra work + attention necessary to maintain the choir to its former high standard - had unalterably resolved to resign but in a special meeting called by the pastor + after earnest persuasion by the pastor in behalf of the choir + the congregation - these able + loyal lady musicians have consented to continue the work + it goes without saying that the pastor, the choir + the congregation are all well pleased + encouraged. It will be a great help in the Sunday services - a help without which the pastor would be vitally crippled + handicapped.

The slow but sure extention [sic] of building + resident population on Western Ave. toward our church encourages us to hope for a bright + prosperous future for our McKownville Church. We only need effective organization, careful + constant pastoral attention + the eye + hand to see + utilize present opportunities to shape the church for real + permanent growth. All this we steadfastly believe + all this we solemnly promise to do - God being our Helper.

The Pumpkins are Coming!!!

In the 17 years our pumpkin patch has been in operation we have raised over \$100,000 in profit and sent missionaries from our congregation to Ireland, Haiti, Uganda, South Africa, Zimbabwe and supported missions within the USA for recovery work in areas hit by natural disasters like the Midwest Tornados and Hurricane Sandy. In January, 2017 we had two members from our church family participating in the Mission of Peace whom our Pumpkin Scholarship assisted as they traveled to the Nicaragua!

<u>Unloading Day crew:</u> – young and young-at-heart alike can help with unloading and arranging pumpkins of all sizes. I also need a couple of people to help erect the sales tent and bring out tables. Dinner and beverages will be provided

<u>Pumpkin Patch Sitters</u>: - if you are able to sit for 2-3 hour shifts during the month of October either one time or on a regular shift, a sign up calendar will be available in the sanctuary foyer and online through Google Calendars

<u>Clean up Day:</u> November 1st the last of the pumpkins will need to be moved forward to the edge of the lawn, the tent will need to be taken down. The tables cleaned and returned inside. The decorations stored away until next year. And the pallets brought back to the back parking lot area near the shed.



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10 INTERESTING FACTS ABUT JOHN WESLEY

1. John Wesley wrote one of the all-time bestselling medical texts.

Wesley was deeply convicted that God is concerned about our earthly life as well as our heavenly one. To that end, he wrote a medical text for the everyday person titled Primitive Physick.

2. John Wesley coined the term "agree to disagree."

Over the years, Wesley had serious theological differences with another popular pastor named George Whitefield. Though they both argued passionately, Wesley reflected on these differences in a memorial sermon for Whitefield by saying: "There are many doctrines of a less essential nature. ... In these, we may think and let think; we may 'agree to disagree.' But, meantime, let us hold fast the essentials. ..." This appears to be the first recorded use of the term. It was a hallmark of Wesley's way of holding to his convictions while remaining in connection with those with whom he disagreed.

3. John Wesley rode far enough on horseback to circle the earth 10 times.

Wesley rode 250,000 miles! He was convinced that it was important for him personally to spread the gospel through relationships and continue to grow closer to God in those relationships. Asked if he would consider walking instead of riding, he replied, "Nay."

4. Wesley had serious doubts about his faith.

Questioning one's faith should not be disparaged. Doubts are essential to making any belief system one's own. They do not mean that one will let it go. In fact, even as Wesley struggled with deep doubts about faith, he followed the wise instruction of a mentor who told him to "preach faith till you have it; and then, because you have it, you will preach faith." Even as we struggle, we can maintain our hold on the truths we question until we can settle all of our doubts.

5. "Methodist" was originally a derogatory term.

Though the origins of the term "methodist" are in dispute, it is clear that it was originally used by outsiders to mock John Wesley and his early societies because of their dedication to following a method for growing closer to God. They ended up accepting the term, considering it a positive descriptor of their movement. Way to own it, Methodists!

6. Wesley counseled people to "eat a little less than you desire."

Staying slim was far from Wesley's goal (1), though he did weigh in around 128 pounds. This was not the result of dieting, but rather of a practice to ensure that people were not ruled by their natural desires, but exercising control over them.

7. Wesley never intended to split from the Church of England.

However, when the revolution happened in the American colonies, most of the Anglican priests returned home. Faced with the fact that none of the Methodists in the colonies could receive the sacraments, Wesley ordained ministers whom he sent to do the same in America (he was practical even when it caused problems). That act was the beginning of the separation that formed the Methodist Church (2) in America. The Methodist Church in England did not officially form until after Wesley's death.

8. Wesley never said this famous quote attributed to him.

It has been on the back of more than one United Methodist youth camp T-shirt: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, as long as ever you can." Though the quote is often attributed to John Wesley and is consistent with his perspective on life, many historians have confirmed there is no record of Wesley ever saying that.

9. Wesley believed you could not be a Christian on your own.

He said that we needed to be involved in "social holiness." Though some often think this term is synonymous with "social justice," its meaning is quite different. Wesley believed we could only grow as Christians in community. In his preface to the 1739 hymnal, he was adamant that "the gospel of Christ knows of no religion but social; no holiness but social holiness."

10. Methodism grew from four to 132,000 members in Wesley's lifetime.

The beginning of Methodism (3) was a group of four who called themselves the "holy club" at Oxford. When Wesley died in 1791, he left behind a movement with 72,000 members in the British Isles and 60,000 in America.




Lord, I pray for your peace to reign in our world today, and to grant the world leaders, wisdom to walk side by side in peace in Jesus name' amen.


