

It is almost hard to believe it is December, but the calendar says it is here. That means we are also starting the Christian seasons of Advent and Christmas. When you think of those words, how do you picture them? Many of us probably have in our heads a nostalgic picture of a Norman Rockwell-type setting, where everyone is happy and all is perfect.

My own experience is that Christmas is seldom as perfect as we hope it might be, and in fact our most pleasant childhood memories are probably not accurate. Seldom is Christmas as magical and lovely as the media portray it, and certainly that first Christmas was filled with unexpected surprise and difficulties. Having a "picture-perfect Christmas" is not likely, nor is it a goal worth pursuing.

I've been thinking a lot about peace lately. The season of Advent highlights the Hope, Peace, Love and Joy that the birth of Jesus offers to us. However, as I read the headlines and hear news of shootings, political dissension, natural disasters, and economic decline I have a hard time connecting it with the Christmas message.

All of these things affect our lives and cause extreme grief and pain to countless people. My point is that there are many people who have lost loved ones, their homes, their communities, and jobs and for them Christmas is anything but "perfect". People are suffering and the world seems to be spinning out of control. All of this can cause us to throw up our hands and shout "Where is the peace?"

As I was preparing my series of messages for this season I read Isaiah 9:6; For a child is born to us, A son is given to us; And the government Is upon His shoulder; And His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace. Those words, "Prince of peace" are a source of great comfort for me. Knowing that I can find peace that the world cannot offer by putting my faith and trust in Jesus is a great source of hope and comfort to me.

My thoughts took me back to the Christmas of 2001 and the final weeks before my Mother's death on January 5th, 2002, I struggled to know how to pray for her. She was declining physically and in a rehabilitation center to help with the side effects from chemo therapy. She didn't want to focus on her condition so we spent a lot of our visits talking about the past and watching her favorite show; Law and Order. Mom was receiving good care, but her quality of life was certainly not what she or any of us, would want to continue forever. So I struggled to pray for her, and I found the most helpful prayer I could offer was for the peace of Christ to be with her.

As Mom began slipping in and out of consciousness the family gathered to be with her and say our goodbyes. On one occasion she popped up her head as if being suddenly awakened from a sound sleep. She looked around at us, smiled and said "Only God, Only God would do it this way", she looked at my sister and I and said "it's no time for tears" and laid her head down and closed her eyes for the final time. When she breathed her last, she was helped by hospice care; she was surrounded by family in the room, I held her hand, and she died peacefully. I believe that my prayers for peace were answered.

In a similar way, I struggle today to know how to pray for our world, our community, and the Church. Solutions to our many problems seem to escape us, and I hear many people rushing to various judgments and irresponsible statements based on misinformation, which is not fitting for our part of the Body of Christ as His disciples.

Ephesians 2:14 reminds us that "Christ is our peace." Those words were addressed to a situation of division within the early church the division between Jews and Gentiles. While we may have our divisions and differences today in the world, the workplace, our families, and the church, none of those can compare to the huge divide that existed between Jews and Gentiles. And so I learn from these scriptures that:

The peace of Christ breaks down barriers. We may believe our current barriers are insurmountable, but Christ has broken down such barriers before and I believe the peace of Christ can overcome any barriers and divisions today. In such spiritual focus, there is unity and peace. The peace of Christ heals. Over the centuries, Christians have found that their differences have been healed only by offering one another the same forgiveness that Christ offers to us. In such forgiveness there is peace.

The peace of Christ brings eternal life. I believe that Mom has received the ultimate healing that is promised to all who are in Christ, and so can we. Someday we will gather at the Kingdom Banquet and all of our current political and theological differences will seem trivial. All of our hurts, hangups and destructive habits will be erased. In such a long-term perspective, there is peace. In Luke's Gospel, Chapter 2, verses 9-14 we read; And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord...And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward humankind.

This is not just the Christmas message. This is the message, period. This is why Jesus came. This is why we can keep on keeping on. This is what life is about. These are the good tidings of great joy: That Jesus came to all people to bring peace and good will to all people, and once we've experienced it, Jesus expects us to pass it on. This is how we glorify God.

During this season of Advent and Christmas we read over and over again that the Babe born in Bethlehem is the Prince of Peace, Emmanuel, God with us. Here's my challenge: Choose to take first the path of peace, in every situation.

Do you have the courage to do it? If you do, not only will it fill your Christmas with peace, it will fill your life with peace. May we all find the peace that we need for whatever circumstances we face. May we all rest in the truth that Christ is our peace and may we a share that peace with the world that so desperately needs it.

I wish you all the peace of Christ this Christmas. Pastor Jeff

Welcome everyone to our Healing Ministry. I hope you all had a nice Thanksgiving with your family and friends.

Now we are preparing to celebrate the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Making shopping lists and Christmas menus can be overwhelming. The cold, rainy and foggy weather can make us uncomfortable.

Let us sit for a minute and ask ourselves how we are going to bring our children into the Christmas celebration? Do they know about the Holy Child? All children associate Christmas with gifts, cookies and Santa. But do they know about the First Christmas? Some may know about it but others will not.

We spend some time talking with children about the First Christmas, the manger and the Baby Jesus. We buy many toys for children at Christmas. Maybe we can read books about the First Christmas and talk about the celebration.

We can tell them the manger was not a house; but a stable for the animals, how it was not clean or decorated, and how it smelled of animals. God sent his only son to be born in a manger. It was a quiet and simple Christmas. The animals walked around and kept Baby Jesus warm. There were no luxurious gifts, perfumes or food. Mary wrapped Baby Jesus in old clothes. Joseph, who was a carpenter, made a crib for Baby Jesus. Let us ask ourselves, how blessed are we? We must guide our children to understand that this blessing came from God. Let us teach them to invite the Holy Child as a Christmas gift.

After telling our children a bed-time story, parents should say a small prayer with them. Leaving the child's room with a prayer makes many blessings.

When my sons were very young, I would lay my hand on them and say a prayer, silently, without disturbing their sleep. I helped them to memorize the scripture words on Sundays. They learned how to pray before they went to school and before they went to bed at night to thank and praise God for all his help.

During the Christmas holiday, let us remember that the Lord Jesus was born to save us. Some parents have a hard time talking to their children about Jesus Christ. Makhi the prophet said, "He will turn the hearts of parents to their children and the heart of children to their parents" (Malach 4:16). Let us pray for the parents who are separated from their children and for the children are separated from their parents. As Malach wrote, "The Lord Jesus will touch them and reunite them to celebrate Christmas."

Let us remember to pray for the families who are far away from each other for whatever reason. Zachariah 11:7 wrote what God had said to him, "I took two staff, one I named favor, the other I named Unity." May God touch the separated families, send his favor to love each other and unite them to celebrate Christmas. Let us bring our men and women who are serving for our nation to the presence of God. Though they are in different places, let us pray for them, "Lord God is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love, he will exult over you with loud singing" (Zephaniah 3:17).

During this Christmas season, let our Lord Jesus Christ send out his healing power to heal us and heal our nearest families and friends. Let their Christmas be filled with joy!

ADULT FORUM


Scrooge!

In response to Albany District churches wanting to know more about vital congregations, the McKownville United Methodist Church is forming a Vital Congregations Self Help Group to continue to bring vital congregation concepts and practices learned at Grace United Methodist Church in Florida to the Albany District. Our goal is to bring churches that are practicing vital congregation techniques together with churches that want to learn and apply these techniques. The group will be led by MUMC's Resource Team, is open to all, and we encourage both clergy and laity to attend. The idea is to share what we learned and what we are practicing with others, help those who want to start, and brainstorm with others who may be stuck in "What do we do next?" Dear Friends

If you could make a difference in the life of someone impacted by Hurricane Harvey would you do it? You can help a college student serve in Puerto Rico during Winter Break! Plans are underway for our Cornerstone Campus Ministry Winter Break Mission Trip in January 2019. This year we are planning to travel to Puerto Rico and work with Lutheran Social Service Puerto Rico to help rebuild homes destroyed by Hurricane Maria. We'd like to invite you to be part of our planning to make a difference in the world!

We have 22 members of Cornerstone planning to participate; that number is higher than usual, so the need for funds is greater. We will housed at the Campamento Lutherano Eduardo Roig outside of San Juan and we will be working with Lutheran Disaster Response to rebuild homes. As you may know, we've made many similar trips to New Orleans, Birmingham, Austin and Houston in the past and each time it has been a life-changing experience for our students as they learn and live in the midst of crises response.

This year we'll be flying down to San Juan on Sunday, January 5 and returning on Saturday, January 12. The trip costs us approximately \$800 per person (including round-trip air fare, ground transportation and the cost of meals and supplies). Because we are part of a joint initiative by the Governor and SUNY Central to get as many students, they will be covering a portion each student's air fare as well as offering a free course credit for their week of service. As a result each student will only need to contribute \$100 towards the cost this year; they may in turn ask their home congregations to cover a portion of that registration fee. The balance is covered though fund-raisers such as bake sales, etc. and generous gifts of our supporting congregations.

We would like to ask you to consider "adopting a student" through your mission or outreach fund or perhaps through your regular operating budget or a special offering. In return, we'll make every effort to schedule a time to report to your congregation about the trip when we return. We can assist with worship or lead an adult forum or assist with a potluck dinner program or whatever creative venue you can provide for us to share our story. "Adoption" costs \$175 per student (of course if you'd like to contribute more, we'd be willing to accept it!)


