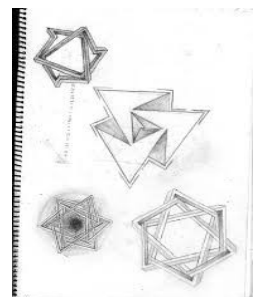
STATEMENT OF THE ARTIST-MATHEMATICIAN

I, Norman Swanson, PhD, would like to say that the new works that I am now showing in the loft area, going up the stairs to the gathering place, are replacing the three pictures of Christ's last days alive.

The seven new works of art/mathematics, that I thoroughly enjoy creating, are now on display. What is difficult is how a person can create a 3-dimensional appearing object on a 2-dimensional canvas. While the works are easy to look at and think about it, it requires the viewer to really stretch his or her mind to wonder how they would create one themselves.

My mathematical and art background makes me very conscious of the overall design of the works. Much of my current works involve mathematical anomalies that appear to be 3-dimensional but in actuality would be impossible to build, what would be called a "trompe l'oeil." Many times I spend more time originating the idea and sketching the possibilities, than it takes to actually paint the picture.

Healing Ministry



Welcome everyone and thank you for supporting the *Ministry of Healing*. We are celebrating the 4th of July, 2019, Independence Day of our nation. Behind Independence Day and our freedom, an unforgettable history is present. For the freedom of our nation and for the people of America, thousands of men and woman gave their precious lives. Some of those who served for our nation's freedom came home with wounds not only in their bodies but in their hearts as well. There are still some veterans in hospitals fighting for their lives. Some of them are still working very hard with physical therapy for healing and to regain their strength. Freedom never comes free.

The Psalm 127:1, which was written by King Solomon, is a meaningful poem and it reads: "Unless the Lord build the house, those who build it labor in vain. Unless the Lord guard the city the guard keeps watch in vein." The Psalm is asserting the utter dependence of individuals and societies upon God for their well being. Human efforts and achievements are vein, unless God is acknowledged as their sources.

I am a nurse and mother of a veteran and I offered my nursing care for the veterans in the hospital, I saw their suffering and pain. I still remember one of the Veteran WW11 POW's saying, "Mom I am coming home, it is full of darkness here, and I am alone." Sometimes I would go and sit in the break room alone, crying and praying for him. Or during my night shift, I would park my car in a parking place and I would stand and look at the sky and shed my tears and pray, "God whoever the veterans are going to be in my assignment, Lord fill me with your healing power and send me to give care for them."

The Veteran families are also part of the freedom of this nation. When they receive their family members after service with wounds and sickness, it is a very painful experience and they need healing, our support, our encouragement go forward with their future plans, and our daily prayers. I would like to help the Wounded Warriors Project and support the fund rising program in our church.

Fighting for our freedom is a painful experience. I would like to share my own life experience and how the Lord, Jesus Christ, helped me in a miraculous way to give me freedom in a middle eastern country, while I was serving as an RN and midwife.

My family and I were in the process of moving from southern India to the USA. We needed help financially for the move. I signed a two-year contract to work in a government maternity hospital at Sana's, the capital of Yemen. All the employees got vacation time and included airfare except me. I went to the hospital administrator and asked why I did not get a vacation. They said, "Tomorrow you will know why." Every week when I asked, I received the same answer. I put all my faith in fasting, praying, and working and I trusted the Lord, Jesus Christ. I joined a worship service in an underground church. We had to hide our Bibles and walk to the church. If the hospital administrator found out, I would have been arrested and I would have been brought to the market place and would have been shot.

I could not approach the Administrator firmly because he belong to that country. I trusted the Lord, Jesus Christ; and, I knew he would perform a miracle. In the middle of this, I was invited by a group of believers from some hospital to conduct a worship service in an under-ground church and I accepted. We had to hide our Bibles and walk to that place. It was a house that belonged to an American family. We all met in the basement of that house. I got my courage and never feared to do the service to God.

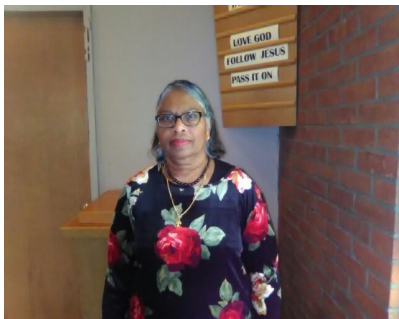
But the Lord, Jesus Christ's, presence is in me and who can be against me? I continued working and serving God without seeing my family. Suddenly the first Gulf War emergencies orientation was given in my hospital and I called my husband and said, "Tell our church to pray for me It is God's will for me to come home alive." But I started praying in the hospital restroom. I always hid my small Bible in my uniform, and while I was working I hid it under the patients examination tables.

My prayers were answered when the hospital's assistant director found my locked passport and airfare ticket. The assistant director approached me and told me that on September 16th I would be going home.. Oh, what a relief! I thanked him several times. When I arrived home, I said, "Thank you father, son of Jesus Christ, for my freedom and answered prayers."

Let us celebrate our freedom on July 4th' and let us not forget to remember the hero's who offered their life for the freedom and all the Wounded Warriors. Please join with me to pray for them and our nation.

"God almighty, thank you for the blessing of Independence Day and the freedom we have . Bless our nation by all your blessings for each and every family. Thank you for the men and woman who served and who are serving for our freedom. Those who need healing pour you mighty healing power and heal them complexly. Give them a blessed future as well as their families. Give those who are in service the wisdom, courage, strength, health, and safety. Bring them back home to their families. We are asking you in the name of your beloved Son, Jesus Christ. Amen, Amen, Amen."

Imagine! Financial Campaign Status

Thank you! to all who made a financial pledge during our recent annual campaign. We asked you to **Imagine** what our church might do in the coming fiscal year and to committee funding that image; 48 persons pledged \$182,256. (Last fiscal year, 57 persons pledged \$179 thousand.) This response is both heartening and disappointing. Heartening because the pledged amount is more, disappointing because fewer persons made a commitment. If you have not yet returned a pledge, please do so promptly. If you cannot find your pledge card, call Christine in the office for a replacement at (518) 456-1148.

Leadership Council in June 2018 approved a budget that was about \$25 thousand short of balancing. In light of this shortfall, Leadership Council urged frugal spending and appealed to the congregation for additional pledging and giving. The response was very favorable. Through the end of May, income has been greater than estimated, due mostly to giving that has exceeded pledged amounts. This generous giving will cover the deficit of a year ago and allow a modest carry-over to next fiscal year, perhaps \$4 thousand. So, a big **THANK YOU** to those who increased their giving beyond their initial commitment.

In the budget for next year, most spending categories will be similar to last year. But we know that expenditures will be significantly larger (1) for staff salaries and benefits and (2) the need for additional building and grounds upkeep. A quick estimate is a shortfall of ~\$37 thousand. We have a reserve fund to cover shortfalls, but this amount would take essentially all of that fund. Leadership Council is reluctant to spend all the reserve in just one year.

This summarizes the situation presented to Leadership Council June 18. At this moment a resolution is not clear. You can do two things: (1) pray for your church and (2) search your heart for whatever additional contribution you might make.



Moving Beyond our Comfort Zone

This was the theme of the 10th session of Upper New York Annual Conference, which was held June 5-8, 2019, at the Oncenter in Syracuse, New York. Before getting into my formal report of the proceedings themselves, it is my pleasant duty to report (for those of you who don't already know) that Rev. Jeff Landon will continue as our pastor. It is also my pleasure to note that two other young ladies who grew up in our church are now both seminary educated pastors under appointment. These two are the latest of several people who have gone from our congregation to become elders, licensed local pastors, and certified lay ministers. This is a testimony to the spiritual life in our midst and reason for us to move forward in our ongoing ministry to the community as part of our work for the kingdom of God.



Over 1,400 people from 865 churches gathered for this session of Annual Conference. It is worth noting that, contrary to expectation, there was a minimum of rancor among the people as they spoke about the many issues presented during our three and a half days of deliberation. In fact, the only time I saw anything resembling anger was on the issue of sexual harassment in the church. One young female pastor spoke with considerable bitterness about how she has been insulted and not been heard as she sought to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. She didn't propose any petition or resolution on the subject; but, she very clearly wanted to make the assembly aware that this is an unfortunate reality in the church at large. To be clear, there was a great deal of emotion during the session; to be more precise, there were a great many emotions manifested - joy, hurt, sadness, frustration, hope, determination, and at times even a sense of betrayal on several topics. By way of illustration, homosexuals felt betrayed as a result of the General Conference 2019, youth (older high school and college students particularly) felt excluded from participating in the life and work of the church because so many meetings took place while they were in school, and (somewhat unexpectedly) racism reared its ugly head again.

It is appropriate to spend some time reflecting on the positive things which took place during our time together. An amazing group of talented young people provided incredible praise music. There were some truly gifted speakers of all ages; and, the concept of "connectional congregations," which is being implemented in the Oneonta District! The speakers deserve more space, so, without turning this report into a book, I'd like to attempt to give them their due. Bishop Mark Webb's central theme reflected the overall theme of the conference. He urged people "to step out of the boat" - referencing Peter stepping out of the boat when Jesus called him to walk on the water. Rev. Dr. Vance P. Ross from Georgia gave a thunderous and powerful message about presenting ourselves as a holy sacrifice to God as we do the work of His Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. The President of the Conference Council on Youth Ministry gave several passionate presentations on scriptures - correctly quoting without notes or Bible, making those readings come alive. There were many more speakers, but there just isn't room to discuss them all. On the other hand, it must be noted that there is considerable time, effort, and money being spent on a program called, Planting New Faith Communities. This program was started just a few years ago and at one point had 130 new faith communities. As of February 1, 2019, there were still 96 such communities active in our conference.

I am, of course, always available to answer specific questions on the Annual Conference.
