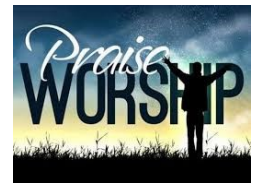

Reflecting the Son

Have you seen a rainbow lately? This is the time of year to catch them. The spring and summer showers that quickly pass allow the sun to come shining through the remaining mist in the air, creating a beautiful arc of color across the sky.



Rainbows have all kinds of stories behind them as we know. There's supposedly a pot of gold at the end of each, but don't base your retirement plans on it. There's a scientific definition also – a rainbow is defined as light dispersing, refracting and reflecting through water droplets resulting in a multi-colored circular arc. Not bad, a pretty simple definition that seems to make sense. There is also a reference to rainbows in the Bible as well. If we search back to Genesis, God created the rainbow as a sign that He would never flood the world again, as He did during the time of Noah's Ark.

So whether we're looking at the worldly definition of a rainbow, or our Biblical reference to why God sent us such a beautiful reminder, they both have something in common. It takes the sun to make the colorful arc in the sky. Without sun light, we would simply see mist and fog. The passing of the sun through the water droplets and the reflection of the light is what creates the beauty we see after the summer showers.

Our daily lives can take a similar path. There are times when we are in the light, with colorful demeanors and energy levels ready to take on another day. And there are of course other times when the clouds move in and all we see is grey; and sometimes that's all others around us see in us. These are the times that we need to lock in on our Faith and know that God will let His Son shine through us to bring us out of the gloom moods. Yes, just like others can see the clouds hanging over us, they can also see and sense the brightness we can bring when we let the Son shine in us!

It's not always easy to respond positively to the "rain clouds" we face, and that's why we don't face them alone. God sent us rainbows as a reminder that He will hold back the rains that can cover the earth, and He also send us His Son to shine His Light upon us as we weather life's storms.

Jesus will see us through our grey days; and provide us with the light we need to restore and reenergize our minds and hearts to once again shine in the light of His love. What He wants most, is for us to show our true colors of love for Him regardless of the weather.

How are we being seen by others and by Jesus today?? Are carrying grey clouds, or are we reflecting the Light of the Son??

Welcome to our Healing Ministry. Thank you everyone for reading our monthly newsletters. May the Lord, Jesus Christ, bless you all and bless this new month of September, 2019.

Searching for things around the house is easy, but sometimes it can be hard. If we think, "who will go around the house, go up stairs, or up in the attic to find things." The same way when we face problems, difficulties, and sickness, we may search God for help. We may say, "God where are you?"

We have an answer from God through the scriptures. In the Book of Deutronomy, 30:11-14, God almighty says: "Surely this commandment that I am commanding you today, is not too hard' for you nor 'too far away'". It is not in heaven that you should say, "who will go up to heaven for us and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it."

"Neither it is beyond the sea, that you say, "who will cross to the other side of the sea for us and get it for us so that we may hear and observe it?"

"No, the word is very near to you, it is in your mouths and in your hearts for you to observe." During our tough times, we have our faith to use the above scriptures. 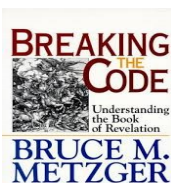
The Wounded Warrior Project focuses on veterans and service members who incurred a physical or mental injury, illness, or wound while serving in the military on or after September 11, 2001.

Every warrior has a mission. We know that the transition to civilian life is a journey. And for every warrior, family member, and care giver, that journey looks different.

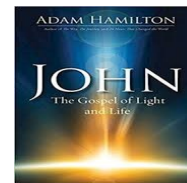

Adult Forum



Adult Forum (Sunday School for grown-ups) *resumes September 8/9, the Sunday after Labor Day*. We meet most weeks Sunday morning 9:30 am - 10:30am and on Monday evenings 7:00 pm --7:59 pm. Both meeting times feature the same topic but the discussion is likely to be different. Classes meet in the Adult Forum Room which is located across the hall from the church library. Class topics include a mixture of Bible study, religious issues, and church history. Most sessions have a video portion followed by discussion. Leaders are Nancy Clarke, Nancy Rutenber, and Henry Walter. We welcome returning members, new folks, aspiring leaders, and suggested lesson topics.

September 8/9 features a video tour of great churches: Sunday the cave churches of Cappadocia, Monday St. Peter's Basilica and churches of Ethiopia carved from rock. Also, attendees will get a map of First Century Bible lands and a reading outline for the next course.

September 15/16 we begin a study of The Revelation to John, last book in the New Testament. Our text guide is "Breaking the Code" by Bruce Metzger. Enthusiastic participants may follow the reading outline to get a head start before class starts. Write down any questions that come to mind. This book is filled with many images, some strange or wild – Seven churches, four horseman, a golden lamp stand, a Lamb, the holy city? (There will not be a quiz.)

Then, Adam Hamilton will guide us through "why" questions: why do innocents suffer, why are prayers unanswered, why can't I see God's will for my life, why does God's love prevail? If you have another "why", bring it to class.

During Advent, Matt Rawle will use personages from The Nutcracker to talk about waiting, loving, changing, and receiving a great gift.

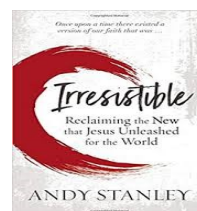
During Epiphany, our guide will be Adam Hamilton. His book John, the Gospel of Light describes and explains Jesus with the metaphor of light. Many parts of this Gospel are familiar, but reading the entire book will help see the big picture and perhaps allow you to formulate three impossible questions to ask of the leader.

Lent is a time when we reflect on our lives and how we match up with the sacrificial love of Jesus. Jacob Armstrong, using his book Renovate, will help us examine how we might change and improve our personal life in light of ideals presented by Jesus.

We conclude the study year with Andy Stanley's book "First Century Faith" which looks at both God's irresistible love and God's irresistible presence in our lives.

Sprinkled among these courses will be short videos on interesting topics: world churches, parables, daily life in exile, and the Star of Bethlehem.

A complete schedule (September through May) may be found in the Adult Forum room or the information rack at the rear of the sanctuary.

Mark your calendar! Our Fall Brooks Chicken BBQ is **Saturday October 5th**. Our leader Chris Spencer is enthused, assistants Matt Steffens and Henry Walter are ready! Now we need helpers! Consult the sign-up sheets in the rear of the Sanctuary, find a favorite task, and write your name in the space and time. AND! You may help more than once and at more than one task! Attention! If you have not personally experienced the surge of excitement that comes with being a part of a traditional McKownville Church – Brooks BBQ, you are especially welcome!

There are many ways to help. News outlets already have our publicity information. Friday and Saturday are key days. Friday October 4: Cole slaw experts needed to mix cabbage, shredded carrots, and blend our secret sauce; cakes to be delivered in the afternoon; cake cutting and boxing in evening; set up serving stations and prepare take-out bags.

Saturday October 5: early in the morning we need folks to measure cole slaw into individual cups and to wrap dinner rolls. By the time we open at 11 am, cashiers, servers, and dining room helpers must be in place. Clean-up Saturday evening is an obvious and critical need! It takes many people to make all this happen, and the more people that help the less any one person must do.



Cake bakers: baking trays will be out on Sunday September 8. Take home one or two trays, bake and ice an outstanding cake (chocolate or vanilla cake, chocolate or vanilla icing, no nuts), and return cakes to the social hall Friday October 4 between 2 pm and 5 pm.. Remember, no nuts because some folks have allergies. Each large pan requires two boxes of cake mix.

The Brooks BBQ has been a tradition here for more than thirty years We have established a new tradition of rotating team leaders. If you would like to apprentice this year, lead next year, and mentor the following year, speak with Chris Spencer or Henry Walter.



ANNUAL CROP WALK REPORT

On a rainy day Sunday afternoon in May, over 275 people walked in the 39th Annual Crop Walk for Hunger. Of that number, five were from the McKownville United Methodist Church. We raised a total of \$96,022.00, of which \$28,005.00 remained in the Capital District for food pantries and soup kitchens. The remaining amount of \$68,017.50 was allocated for hunger relief and development projects around the world. Thanks to the generous support of our sponsors, McKownville United Methodist Church contributed just under \$1,805.00 to this effort.

This is a wonderful testimony to the generosity of the members and friends of our church; but, we cannot stop to “rest on our laurels.” The need continues, and some food pantries report the need is greater than ever before. For this reason, yours truly will be seeking walkers and sponsors again for the next walk, scheduled to be held on Sunday, May 3, 2020.

To our walkers and sponsors, I'd like to say again how very grateful the beneficiaries of your Christ-Like spirit are for this help.

Without all of you, the tragedy of hunger would be even worse than it is at this time.

I know that May is a long way off; but, please keep that date open and plan on joining us for the 40th Annual Albany Crop Walk for Hunger, a/k/a the 3rd Annual John U. Miller Memorial Crop Walk.

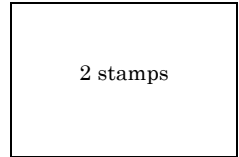
