our call? Unanswered prayers, no help from above, our cries would mean nothing at all.


Where would we be, what would we do, would each of our lives be a loss? If His pain was too great, if He thought not of us, and chose not to walk to the Cross?

What would life be like without Him? Thank God, we'll never know.




We don't need to be a rich, intelligent, or famous among society. Wherever you are and whatever your position is, you can call Him. He is willing to embrace you with

PARSONAGE UPDATE



Over the last year we have been sharing information about the parsonage, asking for donations, prayers and well wishes. As many of you know, we have had many people support us financially and we are so grateful for all of the monetary donations that came in. Currently we are in the process of obtaining a Line of Credit from the bank. This line will allow us to pay off any debt associated with the initial purchase and renovation of the parsonage. Please keep us in your prayers as this is a rigorous process. Once we have the Line of credit, we will be looking to pay it off as soon as possible. We will be looking for ideas for fund raisers and other ideas for helping in this effort.

During the process of purchasing and renovating the parsonage there were many helping hands. Many people donated their time, resources and talents. It was such a blessing that so many people asked what they could do to help and we want to recognize these angels for all they did in support of the parsonage effort.

First, we would like to thank the VanDoren's. Chris offered his services to oversee a complete renovation of the kitchen, providing all of his skills and labor without charge. This was one of the first in-kind donations that we received. Chris not only did the kitchen but worked on an endless list of tasks typical for purchasing an older home. Chris removed the wall between the kitchen and living room to create an open kitchen, hid the support beam in the ceiling, removed all existing kitchen flooring, cabinets, appliances, lights and counters and replaced with new lighting, appli-

ances, plumbing, electrical, cabinets, a granite topped island and new wood flooring. In addition, he installed a new hot water heater, fixed the sump pump, installed additional air vents in the master bedroom, has performed other upgrades to the HVAC systems and continues to work directly with the builder to ensure the addition meets the needs of Pastor Jeff and his family. Noreen VanDoren was also a parsonage warrior. She spent countless hours prepping, painting all of the window and floor trim, cleaning, shopping, working on light plates, arranging to replace the carpet in the family room with only a week's notice, hiring a painter for the ceilings and cellar stairwell, making phone calls, removing a ridiculous number of old floor

staples and creating "TO DO" lists for the various tasks that needed to be performed by the volunteers. This is a mere sampling of all the work she did.

We also want to thank Nan Pullen for her in-kind donations of new bedroom blinds and a living room blind and thank Tricia Stott for her donations of paint, curtains and curtain rods for the front room as well as outdoor lights by the front and garage doors, and a new American flag. In addition, we thank Tricia's friend Bonnie who was kind enough to hem the curtains for us so they didn't cover the heating wall vents.





A big thank you goes out to James Stott, Tricia Stott, Kelly Visker and Nancy Rhodes who all pitched in with the painting, installation of blinds, curtains, smoke detectors and switch plates as well as the removal and disposal of the carpets and more floor staples. Nancy Rhodes also donated and installed a stair runner.

We want to recognize and thank Kelly and Chris Visker who donated a washer and dryer for the basement as well as a lawn mower, and who obtained a second washer and dryer set for the addition, as a donation from Grace Baptist Church. A thank you goes out to Harold Stott for painting the family room with its very tall ceilings

and to Arthur Stott who brought sandwiches to the weary workers one day. Tom Myers and James hauled construction material from the house renovation from the garage across the front yard to the dumpster, on what turned out to be one of the coldest days we saw this past winter. Tom also assisted in getting the generator and new garbage disposal working and we thank him for his help.

Last, but not least, we were blessed with the help of Darcianne Lizer and Angela Stott as well as the rest of the gang (Nancy Rhodes, <u>Kelly Visker</u>, <u>James Stott</u>, <u>and Tricia Stott</u>) in performing the final cleaning of the parsonage to make it ready for Pastor Jeff and his family to move in on January 29, 2022.

For a lot of us, this group effort was a time not only to help the church but also to work together and in fellowship. We had the opportunity to greet one another in person, work side by side and talk about our lives (through masks), give our opinions on the renovations made, as well as those that will be needed in the future, to share a meal and spend time working together towards a common goal – a parsonage we could be proud of to house Pastor and his family. We are so thankful for all the time, effort and materials that have been provided to our church to purchase and renovate the parsonage and we wanted to take this opportunity to remember how truly blessed we are to have such a supportive and caring church family.





McKownville Methodist Episcopal Church 1930 Snapshot in Time at Episcopal Church





Mark Curtiss Rutenber, the about 20-year-old teacher of this Sunday School class, was the youngest of three children born to Edwin Parker Rutenber and his wife Mary Alice Simpson. Parker and his family moved about 1922 from Sidney, NY to Guilderland where he died in a 1929 accident. Sons Crosby and Curtiss later lived in adjoining houses on Schoolhouse Road.



When McKownville's new Sunday School and Community Hall addition was dedicated in November 1928, morning worship was at 10:30 a.m., Sunday School was at Noon, and Epworth League (youth) was at 7:00 p.m. Methodist pastor appointments (as now) were mid-year. Rev. C. W. S. Becker was pastor from 1928 to 1930. Rev. George Robinson, born in England, was then pastor after the 1930 change-over to 1933.

One of the SS boys **Karl Edmund Krausse** had joined the church as a (preparatory) member in January 1930. Three of the boys (**Stanley Nicholas Crouse, Maurice Philip Loeper, William Laughlin Norton**) joined as part of a 25-member class on Palm Sunday, March 29, 1931. (*See figure.*) A fifth boy **Thomas Prout** was received as a preparatory member in May 1932. The other boy **James Curliss** apparently left.

In about eight weeks, it will be time for our next semi-annual Brooks Bar B Que. The event will again be a drive thru, full dinners only. The price will remain at \$13.00. The hours of operation remain from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm. I hope to sell a minimum of 800 dinners in order to reach our target net profit of \$4,000.00. More information will be shared as it becomes available.



The bigger question remains: "Why are we doing this event?" We have done it for over 35 years now; but what is the purpose? The purpose is to be able to not only finance our administrative expenses (which comprise well over 90% of our budget), but also to finance actual ministries: worship, education, outreach, etc. We have had many training programs recently on Leadership Development, Making Disciples, Lay Servant Ministries, Lay Speaker Ministries, etc. We need to apply what we have learned and actually not only MAKE disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, but BE disciples of Jesus Christ for

the transformation of the world. It's about much more than selling chickens to stay open; it's about being faithful to our true purpose—moreseo than even given the uncertain future of the United Methodist Church. We may not be able to impact what happens at the national church level; but, we can and must impact what happens in our community and in our conference. This is about stepping up (no pun intended, referencing the CROP WALK to be held on May 1, 2022). Many people have worked hard over the years. The need is not for those same people to work harder; rather the need is for more people to join the effort.

I will shortly be asking for volunteers to help make this event the most successful one yet—not the vague purpose of "balancing the budget" (which is, of course, important); but for the specific purpose of having resources (human and financial) to reach out and serve a desperate world RIGHT HERE in our local communities as well as in wider settings. *Please keep this date open on your calendar and join the effort to serve Jesus Christ by actively engaging in His work in the world.*

ANNUAL CROP WALK SUNDAY, MAY 1, 2022



On Sunday, May 1, 2022, the First Lutheran Church of Albany will host its annual CROP WALK for Hunger. We have heard for years now how much good Church World Service and these walks for hunger have done around the world. But the need continues and seem to grow exponentially! For this reason, the need for walkers and sponsors to combat the plagues of starvation, illiteracy, poverty, and homeless is greater than ever!! We are constantly saying "As United Methodist Christians, we are called upon to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation

of the world." I respectfully submit that, as CHRISTIANS (I hate denominational labels anyway), we are called upon to BE disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world! What does that mean precisely? It means stepping up when there is a pressing need. The issues mentioned above are indeed critical needs on a global basis. How do we combat these issues? By stepping up (no pun intended) literally and figuratively! Those who are able, put on your walking shoes. The courses are quite short (only 1 mile and 3 miles respectively). Those who are not able, write a check to sponsor the walkers or donate on line through the CROP WALK website: www.crophungerwalk.org/albanyny.

The walk itself will be by hybrid—meaning people have the option of either walking as a group or starting and ending at the First Lutheran Church in Albany (time to be confirmed later) or walking in your own neighborhoods alone or with friends, neighbors, and families.

I will be attending the next rally on March 20th to pick up information packets and sponsorship envelopes. After that, announcements will be made asking for your support in whatever means possible. Aids to being Worship Leader -

Service outline and scripture: Look at a copy or email of the worship outline to familiarize yourself with the service for which you will be Lay Worship Leader. This includes the church policy about wearing masks.

Be early and get ready: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.

The microphone will be turned on; if you are tall or short, you may need to move it closer to your mouth. The visuals team started a 5-minute timer on the monitors to help get the services started on time.

The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.

Remember that worship is to God. Thank you for helping the congregants worship.




