



Annual CROP Walk Final Report June 19, 2022



On June 17, 2022, I received a report of the final results of the May 1, 2022, John U. Miller CROP Walk; and, it was an absolute miracle! This year, a total of \$111,000.00 was raised from this event. Of that amount, \$27,750.00 (25%) will be distributed among the 26 local food pantries and soup kitchens and \$83,250.00 (75%) will be remitted

to Church World Services for global relief efforts. In the 42 years of the history of the Albany CROP Walk, such an amount has never been raised!! Of the 550 nationwide CROP Walk events, this amount places the John U. Miller CROP Walk in the top 5 in terms of funds raised!

As wonderful as this news is, however, we cannot "rest on our laurels" or "take a bow" for a job well done. The need continues; and, is greater than ever. You have heard over and over about the extreme poverty in 3rd world nations and the suffering now being endured in Ukraine as well as many other places in Europe, Asia, and around the world! Indeed, it is only necessary to walk through downtown Albany, NY, to see homeless people seeking food and shelter. Walk through the abandoned homes and businesses especially in South Albany and North Albany and you get a sense of how these urgencies have had huge impacts IN OUR OWN BACK YARDS!

For this reason, I ask you to SAVE THE DATE (Sunday, May 7, 2023) for next year's walk for hunger. It will also be possible to donate on line through the CROP Walk's website when that opens for 2023. I plan on being the team captain again next year, so anyone is free to call or write to me. My contact information is available in the directory or through the church office.

MCKOWNVILLE CHURCH AND ITS 1968 CHANGE IN PARSONAGE





A previous article told about our church's buying a newly built church parsonage in McKownville which was first used as such in 1920 after the McKownvill M.E. Church split from the Guilderland circuit.

These drawings of the Waverly Place and Northgate Drive parsonages come from the cover of the March 1968 102th Annual Fourth Quarterly Conference reports.

Need for a new Parsonage – The same year 1965 as James Beskin became the pastor, new bathroom fixtures (tub, shower, lava-

tory, etc.) were installed. In September 1966 the Official Board appointed a *Parsonage Study Committee*. The committee surveyed the property against newer minimum conference requirements and reported April 1967 that it would take extensive renovation and repair to bring it to contemporary standards for a pastoral family, with between \$8000 and \$9000 just to put the parsonage in good condition. Also, there was not room on the lot for additional construction.



Purchase - A Study Committee for the New Parsonage was established and on January 13, 1968 put a contingent binder on the colonial split level house at 41 Northgate Drive in Westmere, which was about $2-2\frac{1}{2}$ miles west of the church. January 27, 1968 a special fourth quarterly conference (charge conference) and congregational meeting approved purchase of this property and the sale of the 1920 parsonage. The three-year old house had on the ground level a kitchen and dining room, family room, and living room with brick fireplace. A full bath and four bedrooms (one very small suitable for a study) were up a short flight of stairs. Up another short flight of stairs in the area above the kitchen and dining room was a very large room then used as a bedroom. The pictures showing this property were taken in September 1999.

The parsonage at 10 Waverly Place was sold for \$17,900 and became a private home. The new parsonage cost \$29,000 plus \$6000 for new furnishings, for a total of \$35,000. This home was used as a parsonage from 1968 until 2001, and by the Beskins to mid-1978.

One copy of the Worship Leader Reference is kept in the pulpit/lectern. The pastor or guest speaker can inform you if there are any changes.

Aids to being Worship Leader:

Service outline and scripture: Look at a copy or email of the worship outline to familiarize yourself with the service for which you will be Lay Worship Leader. This includes the church policy about wearing masks.

Be early and get ready: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.

The microphone will be turned on; if you are tall or short, you may need to move it closer to your mouth. The visuals team started a 5-minute timer on the monitors to help get the services started on time. The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.

Remember that worship is to God. Thank you for helping the congregants worship.


