HOW CAN I KEEP FROM SINGING YOUR PRAISE?

One of the difficult things about the pandemic has been the restrictions on singing in the church. At first, people were asked only to 'hum along' with any songs, which were all pre-recorded. Then we advanced to sing 'if you are masked and more than 6 feet from another person'. Now we have advanced to 'masks are recommended but optional and you may sing if you are more than 3 feet from anyone not living in your household.'

All of this has made choir singing difficult. We started with choir rehearsal OUTSIDE under the entry canopy. We moved into masked and 6 feet apart upstairs in the chapel, then to the front of the sanctuary. Welcome to our Ministry of Healing. I want to share with you all the good news about the midwives in our bible. When I was in the college of midwife, one book was Two-Key Midwife, from London. It has a little amount of information that the word midwife came after the birth of Moses in the Bible. The nurse midwife's job is a ministry to God. There were two midwives in the Old Testament. In the Exodus, 1:15-21, the scriptures are speaking about these midwives, Shiphrah and Puah. Some of the research in Jewish text says they were Jochebed, the Mother of Moses, and the other midwife was his sister, Miriam. The midwives cleanse the new born babies by washing them, and cleansing the after birth. Whatever their ethnicity was, these two women assumed a heroic role in subverting the command of the Pharaoh, the King of Egypt,



The king of the Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, "When you serve as a midwife to the Hebrew women and see them upon the birth stool if it is a son, you shall kill him; but, if it is a daughter she shall live." (Exodus 1:15-16). The midwives however feared God, and did not do what the King of Egypt told them to do. They let the boys live. (Exodus 1:17). When the King of Egypt asked them, they said that the Hebrew women are so vigorous that they gave birth before the midwife arrives (Exodus1:19). The Hebrew midwives lied and disobeyed the king's command. These woman showed great courage and love for God by risking their lives.

This is the hardest part for the midwives. During this time, there was no medical equipment to know if the baby was going to be a boy or a girl. Then how did they find out if the baby was a boy or a girl? The old history tells us that if a baby was born face down looking to the earth it would be a boy and if the baby was born face up looking up to heaven then it would be a girl. Maybe this old history helped the Hebrew midwives to found out if it was a boy or a girl. The Israelites were fruitful and increased in numbers during the Shiphrah period. If we read the old testament in the Book of Isaiah, Chapter 66:9, it says, "Shall I bring to the birth and not cause to bring forth? says the Lord., shall I who cause to bring forth shut the womb? says the Lord."

"I will multiply them and they shall not be few. I shall make them honored and they shall not be small." (Jeremiah 30:19). Because the Israelites numbers were increasing, this made the King of the Egypt kill the male children. But God of the Israelites used the midwives as an instrument to activate his commands to save the baby boys. The bible is filled with examples of those who were willing to sacrifice their very lives in order to obey God or to serve others. Esther in 8:2 and 4:13-16, and Abednego, Shadrach, Meshach, Daniel 3:16-18 are some of the people who took bold stands for what was right.



From these examples, we must understand and obey God rather than man. Did God bless the Hebrew midwives for lying to Pharaoh?

The God of the Israelites pleased them not because they lied; but, because they saved the lives of innocent children for not violating the higher law of God that forbid the senseless slaughter of innocent lives.



I want to share my experience and introduce myself as a graduated registered nurse and midwife in 1970 from a government college of nursing and the college of midwife. In India. I worked in the labor room as a nurse and midwife in India and Yemen. I conducted hundreds of deliveries and held the fresh, new born babies in my hands. It was a very precious moment in my life. Before I went to my job, I prayed and before enter into the labor room to conduct the delivery I prayed and ask the Lord to bless the mother to have a healthy baby and safe delivery. After I conducted a

delivery and received the fresh born baby in my hands, some of the babies were just opening their eyes to looked at me. It was a priceless moment in my life.

A doctor, nurse or midwife's duty is a life saving Ministry to God Almighty. After COVID-19, all the doctors, nurses, and medical team members in the hospitals, clinics, and nursing homes were making sacrificial services for the communities. They are heroes. Some are offered lives to save the life services. They need our daily prayers for the medical services they perform and for their families.

Let us Pray for them:

"God of Israelites, Son of God, and the Holy Spirit, we unite our hearts and minds and pray for all the doctors, nurses, midwives, medical employees, and administrative professionals. Pour out your presence in them. Be with them, give them help while they serve patients, and keep them safe. Give them strength, peace and joy. Bless them to have perfect health in all of their lives. Bless their families by all your blessing now and forever. Amen, Amen, Amen."

Finance Situation at McKownville Church



At the end of July (seven months through our 2022 budget year) our financial situation is not as good as we had planned. In the budget approved by Leadership Council January 2022, income and spending were in balance at \$245,703. We expected income through seven months to be \$137,002 but actual receipts of \$119,390 are short by \$17,612. Pledged income was \$88,512; unpledged income was \$19,342; unidentifiable plate offering \$3,201, building use \$3,423; MayBBQ \$3,724; miscellaneous \$1,188.

In our Fall 2021 Financial Campaign, forty seven persons made combined pledges of \$160,000. Of these, **17** are behind by a collective \$8,392, **8** are current with their pledge, and 22 are ahead of pledge by \$12,871. **Thank you to those who are current or ahead.**

- ⇒ PLEA 1: If you are behind in your giving, please make your pledge current.

 Twenty seven persons made no pledge but have given \$17,702. Thank you for you support.
- ⇒ PLEA 2: Please consider making a pledge for 2023 during our Financial Campaign in October. It will help our planning.

In all, 74 persons have given toward our budget this year compared to 91 last year.

We anticipate a serious shortage of about \$40 thousand by the end of the year. This is due to a mismatch between the planned amount (\$203 thousand) and actual pledges (\$160 thousand). Giving by those who pledged is close to their pledged amount, but the pledged amount is seriously short of need. We balanced the budget by suggesting a withdrawal from our special fund stock account. That amount would be more than half the fund. We wish strongly not to do so. We asked for your support and you responded generously. We ask again for full support.

- ⇒ PLEA 3: If possible, increase your giving in the balance of 2022 to decrease the need to use funds from the special reserve account.
- ⇒ PLEA 4: Support our fund-raising chicken BBQ this coming October 1. Speak to your friends and neighbors.

There are few places to trim our budget. Most of our spending is for staff and buildings. Our pastor's salary, his health benefits, and his retirement costs must meet Conference minimums. Our Ministry Shares (our contribution to programs of the larger United Methodist Church) are set by Conference. The costs of using and maintaining our physical assets, relatively steady year to year, are subject to the pressure of inflation. Our staff must be paid. Remaining costs are for all the other things that we do: worship, Christian Education for children and adults, outreach to our community (meeting space to twelve support groups for persons with addictions), and senior activities. Separate from our budget is our mission program, funded independently by our Pumpkin Project. This activity, concentrated in the six weeks from late September to Halloween, raises the money we use for missions. Specifically, this money helps to send youth to national conferences, send workers to service projects in Appalachia, and assist persons going on mission to a foreign country. Enthusiastic volunteers are always welcome at the Pumpkin Patch! Watch for the sign-up sheet.

McKownville United Methodist Church is a good place for worship, fellowship, and community service. Help us remain strong. **Thank you.**

UMCOR Cleaning Kit Materials

- One five-gallon round bucket with re-sealable lid (14.35" h x 12.19" w x 12.19" d)
 - No screw lids
 - May be used, but must be free from all residual product
 - Advertisements on the outside acceptable
- One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner
 - No spray cleaners
- One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap
- One 4-8 oz. pump spray air freshener (liquid, not gel)
- One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable)
 Pump spray bottles must have protective covers
- One scrub brush
 - With or without handle
- 18 re-useable cleaning wipes-
 - No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels-
 - Remove from packaging
- Five scouring pads
 - No stainless-steel pads with soap in them
 - Remove from packaging
- 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- 24 roll of heavy-duty trash bags (33-45-gallon sizes)
 - Remove from packaging
- Five N95 particulate respirator dust masks (1-3 mm thickness)

UMCOR also provides technical support and training for partners to address emerging and ongoing issues related to disaster relief, recovery, and long-term health and development.

2022 United States UMCOR Disaster Response

Flooding in Kentucky

In late July, Kentucky and other parts of Appalachia experienced devastating flooding resulting in the loss of life and property. UMCOR awarded a solidarity grant to the Kentucky Annual Conference and delivered nearly 3,000 kits during the first week of the disaster. In coordination with the conference disaster response coordinator, UMCOR-trained Early Response Teams (ERT) are deploying to the affected areas.

Severe weather and tornadoes in Wisconsin, Michigan and South Carolina

Severe weather and tornadoes touched down in many regions of the U.S. during the spring and summer months. UMCOR awarded solidarity grants to the above conferences in support of immediate response to the damage and to meet the needs of survivors.

Wildfires in New Mexico

Beginning April 5 and continuing into May, multiple fires burned hundreds of thousands of acres in New Mexico. UMCOR awarded a solidarity grant to the New Mexico Annual Conference to support the needs of evacuees and coordinate debris removal and cleanup efforts.

Tornadoes in Florida

On January 16, several rotations touched down and caused significant damage to residential and commercial properties, displacing roughly 300 people. UMCOR awarded an initial solidarity grant and is financially supporting the Florida Conference in a 2-year recovery project that will focus on home repair and case management.

motivate them. Like other civil servants in the country, income is really low. This is made worst by the biting inflation which is now hitting all economies of the world. They have requested some support from the hospital management. Their hard work has made Emmanuel's work a lot easier. But this may be short lived as one of them told me about processing documents to move to greener pastures. It was certain to us that the other two may not be different. We held discussion with them and the indication is that if the hospital can assist them, that will be an encouragement and motivation to continue work. We are therefore appealing for special support forthese doctors. We believe that even a minimum monthly support of \$100 each will be appreciated. We will not want to lose them at least for now.

Florence is doing fine with her responsibility for the pregnant women in the Waiting Mothers Home/shelter. As of now there are 57 pregnant women in the shelter. Some have come from far away as Harare area, 5 hour drive from here. We are not sure what attracts them, but one probable factor is the free feeding. The free feeding fund has been coming principally from the German United Methodist Church board, Drs Marvin and Sylvia Reimer from the Upper New York Conference, and other friends from Upper New Conference. We thank them all for this specific support. Sustainability is still an issue. We thank everyone for your kind support through the Advance giving. The southern Africa region is going through Winter season now. Here in Zimbabwe the winter this year is too, too chilly and wet, falling short of snow. As far back as we could remember, it has never been this cold since we arrived in 2006. This time we really needed to warm up our rooms and purchased more heaters for staff in various departments. We didn't have enough to warm up patients in the wards except for the

Pediatric ward. Other patients would use double blankets to keep warm.

The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.




