










Grace Period



Have you ever felt you were "saved" by a "grace period??" A grace period is defined as extended time to pay off a debt, typically without incurring additional interest or charges. This may come in handy, especially this time of year when the credit card bills come rolling in from the Holidays. Sometimes we just need a little bit of time to get things in order. Maybe we need to wait for that month end paycheck, or perhaps a grace period is needed for a payment because an unexpected expense occurred f from something else.

Yes, grace periods can be a relief. Companies collecting our debts don't have to offer them, but they do so that the situation is a "win-win." They collect what's due to them, and those of us that take advantage of the extra time (the "grace period") are able to balance our finances over a longer period of time.

Is there a catch to this? Of course! We've all heard the phrase, "there's no free lunch," right? If we don't meet the financial obligation during the grace period, the stakes become higher and our debt increases. In addition, the next bill is coming right around the corner, and we need to be prepared to pay that one also. If we don't take action right away, the grace period vanishes quickly leaving us in a deeper hole than when we started.

Fortunately, with our Faith in our Lord, we have a different definition for "grace period," and it's one that has a much longer impact than our month to month credit card payments. As we look forward to the year ahead, with the New Year still fresh in mind, let's keep in mind that Jesus has provided us with a Grace Period that extends through our lives here on earth, and into eternity with Him. Jesus doesn't look for payment from us, He cleared all of our debts on the Cross. Nor does Jesus look for us to



make "interest payments" when we make mistakes and fall short of His example. What He does look for is for us to fully give our hearts to Him in all we do. Offering our lives to Jesus frees us from any and all debt from our past, present and future mistakes, shortcomings and sins.

God sent us His Son not to collect our debts, but to pay our debts, in full, for eternity. There's no "catch" to what God has given us. When we give our lives to the Lord, Jesus will provide us with the everlasting Grace Period that only He can offer.

Let's ask Jesus to fill our hearts today with His love and the peace of His Holy Spirit, and enjoy His Grace Period today, tomorrow,...., and forever!!

THE HEAVENLY CHEF

Welcome everyone to our Ministry of Healing.

We are in the second month of the new year. We sometimes go to work and may have stress from our families, finances, children or other issues. During our lunch breaks or after work we may go to a restaurant for food to relax from the stresses of life. When we enter into a restaurant, we may be welcomed by a smiling greeter who invite us in. They guide us immediately to a table or perhaps be placed on a waiting list. Very shortly we may get a table and we are given a menu. The server will politely take our order. Sometimes we may change our order, but the server would smile and say, "Don't worry I can easily change that." And that sounded so good to hear. Whatever we decided to order would be prepared by the chefs in the kitchen.

Records indicate that the kitchen was founded in early 1648 at the estate of John Porter of Windsor, Connecticut. In the kitchen the chefs carefully prepared the food to make the customer have tasty and safe food. They may work in a very hot, humid filled atmosphere and also for long hours. No matter what their stresses are in life, they are in the kitchen working with their skilled hands to prepare the meat, cutting up the vegetables, and cooking in front of the hot stove. God gave them that gift with their hands.



In the bible, just like a restaurant, there was a sea shore kitchen. In the gospel of John 21:1-17, a chef was cooking food. This happened after the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ. In John 21:3, Peter said, "I am going out to fish." Thomas and Nathanael said, "we'll go with you." It was in the night that maybe the disciples lost their faith, lost their hope to do the ministry, or feared the Roman soldiers may arrest them. The disciple, Peter, may have thought, "The Lord is gone, let me go back to my old job as a fisherman to survive as well as to have safety in my life." Two other disciples also joined with him. They went to the Sea of Galilee to fish in the night. The Sea of Galilee has another name which is the Sea of Tiberias. Maybe they put their nets on the left side of their boat. All night they caught nothing in their nets. Their hands may have been tired, and they may have

felt exhausted. They were skilled fishermen, but where were the fish? "Early morning, Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus." (John 21:4). He knew that there were no fish in their nets. "He called out to them, "Friends haven't you any fish." (John 21:5). If we were the disciples, what would we say? "Who is this asking us to fish all night and putting the nets in the water while our hands were getting sore? Gospel work is not safe for us, fishing also failed, and this man is laughing at us. They said, "No". Then they heard a man's voice from the shore saying, "Throw your nets on the right side of the boat and you will find fish." (John 21:6). The disciples did and they were unable to haul the nets because of the 153 fishes that were in the net. When they were on shore, they saw a fire of burning coals and there were fish on it and some bread.



On the shore, it was our Lord, Jesus, cooking breakfast for his disciples. Maybe the Lord, Jesus, commanded all the fish to hide on the right side of the boat. He wanted to test the faith of his disciples. He wanted to refresh their faith in God. He wanted to cook breakfast and heal their weakness and tried to get strength to go for the ministry work and not the old job. We can understand that our Lord is also a skilled Heavenly chef. In John 21:10, Jesus said to them, "bring some of your fish that you have got." Then He said, "Come and have breakfast (John 21:11). He wanted to strengthen his disciples to go for his ministry, to spread the gospel. On the sea shore, Jesus was healing the discomfort of His disciples.



I want to share one of my experiences with the scripture (Josh 21:1-11). I never learned how to cook food. After I was married, one morning I wanted to cook a cup of rice. I put water (an unmeasured amount) over the rice in the pot. It cooked, but it came out like soup. I tried three times and the outcome was the same. I was sad, so I turned off the stove. I then cried and got my bible and opened to the gospel of John 21:9, 12, and started reading. I prayed saying, "Lord, Jesus, you know how to cook and here I am struggling to cook this

rice. I have no one to teach me. I have my faith in you, you will teach me how to cook with water please." I closed my bible. I put the water and rice in the pot again, made a sign of the cross over the pot. I covered the pot and continuously prayed. After 15 or 20 minutes, I turned off the stove. When I opened the lid, I saw the white flower-like rice cooked perfectly. I put the rice on the plate and I said, "Thank you Jesus for teaching me to cook." After this, I was able to cook rice and it comes out perfect to the taste. But when I first started cooking, I said my prayer in the kitchen. The Lord, Jesus, taught me.

Let us bow our heads and pray: "Son of the Most High God, Jesus Christ, your hands laid on the blind and healed,. You laid your hands on the sick and healed. You touched a young man and healed his death and gave life. Your hands cooked food for your disciples, Lord we are asking You touch and pour out Your resurrected Christ, power in the hands of each chef and all the serving staff's. Lord bless them, if anyone is sick heal them. Bless their families, provide all as their need's, fill them with your joy, and peace. Lord Jesus, listen their prayer's and prosper them, their business, and their future in Your precious name. Amen.

How Did McKownville do Financially?



For the year 2022, we spent \$14,190 more than we took in. Spending was down significantly from 2021, yet we still had a shortfall because overall giving was also down. In spite of being short, members and friends of McKownville United Methodist Church are to be congratulated for their giving in 2022.

During the year, 86 individuals or families (both pledging and non-pledging) contributed \$193,612 toward our budget, an average of \$2,251 per family. But averages can be misleading. Some families were able to give more and some only able to give less. About one-third of giving (\$63,700) was given by 3 families, about one-third (\$64,165) was given by 12 families, and about one-third (\$65,494) was given by 71 families. This pattern of giving is typical for non-profit organizations that depend upon many individual gifts: a few persons are able to give much, many are able to give some, and some are able to give a bit. To each who gave, a hearty "Thank You!"

Forty seven of these 86 contributors made a pledge. Of pledging persons, 22 persons paid more than pledged by a collective excess of \$11,725; 14 persons gave exactly as pledged; 11 persons gave less than pledged by a collective shortage of \$6,036. Overall, donations from all pledging persons was 103% of the total pledged.

Prospects for a balanced budget in 2023 are not bright. Pledges received to date (\$161,896) are significantly short of the \$202,000 needed to balance the budget, even with some drastic spending cuts. We ask each member and friend to consider the possibility of an additional pledge for 2023 over and above what you pledged just last Fall. And continue to hold McKownville United Methodist Church in your prayers.

From our Church Historian...




<u>Rev. Roy Emerson Dunckel, McKownville Methodist Pastor</u> 1936 – April 1938

Roy Emerson Dunckel was born in 1883 at Freya Bush, NY and graduated from Fort Plain High School. Deciding in 1913 to enter the Methodist ministry, he pursued theological studies at summer sessions at Drew Theological Seminary and at Cornell Rural Pastors School. After completing the Conference Course of Study, Dunckel was ordained Deacon in 1920 and Elder in 1923 by Troy Conference and served at: Huntersland, Sanfords Ridge and West Fort Ann, Upper Jay, Central Bridge and Grosvenors Corners, Richmondville and West Richmondville, Hartford and Belcher, Luzerne, Chazy and Valcour, Gallupville and West Berne, McKownville, Pine Grove, Sharon Springs and Sharon, Willsboro and Reber, Jay and Wilmington. It was remembered that Dunckel "felt God's hand in all things." He retired at age 72 in 1956 and died in 1965.



While at McKownville, Dunckel wrote the following in our **Historical Record** (emphases added):



It is now April, 1938. Rev. Becker, Tynan, Robinson, and Wersen have served pastorates here and left. I am leaving. *The old debt remaineth an abomination to the righteous*. \$9675 [today about \$204,280] — and those who placed it on the church have nearly all moved away.

In 1936 I found the people discouraged. Besides the interest owed, there was a large coal bill, a years salary due the janitor, and twelve resignations of key positions, such as Financial Sec., S. S. Supt., Chorister, Junior Department Supt., E. L. President [Epworth League for young people], S. S. teachers, etc. etc. The first congregation numbered 18. Four men.

Due to God's goodness – and in answer to prayer – attendance has increased 50%. Our last service numbered 196. Have received 10 new members, Baptized 10. Received two by letter.

The Win One Class [a women's group] has raised \$1191.00 this year – over \$2000.00 [now about \$42,836] for two years. There are thirty active members. We have organized a Junior Choir with 18 members. Miss Dorothy and Miss Marion Rogers have served as Choir Director and Organist. A Junior League [youth] has also been established with four classes and twenty-eight members in the little Branch School House. We have established a Community service with meetings every other week and attendance ranging from 25 to 55. The last service – a surprise for the Pastor and wife – a Banquet with 70 present. Pastor presented a ring and wife presented a flowering plant. A mens' club has met regularly this past winter – mostly young men number ranging from 15 – 25. These men have entertained Delmar M. E. Men, American Lodge I.O.O.F., St. Peters Lutheran, etc. For two years the young people have had Basket Ball teams coached [?] by the Pastor. During Lenten period prayer services were held in homes – three services per week. The last Holy Communion was one of the largest in church history of recent years.

Rev. F. R. Bradley, an able minister, succeeds me as pastor this year serving both Grace and McKownville churches. Upon call of the Pastoral Relations Committee of Pine Grove, seconded by the entire church of that place, District Supt. Mark Kelly D.D. with the Bishop and Cabinet have transferred me to that charge. May God bless McKownville and everyone here, especially the new Pastor and family. May the best years of all years be this year for our beloved *church on the hill*.

Dunckel wrote a hymn Sunshine and Shadows, published in 1919, which proclaims: "When e'er my soul is thirsting, the clouds of grace hang low, And where their shadows gather the living waters flow; When sunny paths grow weary the cooling shadows fall, For sunshine and for shadow, O praise the Lord of all."

Aids to being Worship Leader:

Service outline and scripture: Look at a copy or email of the worship outline to familiarize yourself with the service for which you will be Lay Worship Leader. This includes the church policy about wearing masks.

Be early and get ready: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.

The microphone will be turned on; if you are tall or short, you may need to move it closer to your mouth. The visuals team started a 5-minute timer on the monitors to help get the services started on time. The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.

Remember that worship is to God. Thank you for helping the congregants worship.






