# CONTAGIOUS???




*Oh no, are you contagious??* We're worried, we're concerned. We've just come out of the worst pandemic of our generation, and we're still concerned about COVID-19. In addition, the cold and flu season is right around the corner. Whenever we're near someone with a sniffle, we wonder, "What is it, is it contagious??" Our lives have changed over the past few years, and we've become sensitized to any signs of illness that may be passed along to us. We don't want to be contagious, and we take precautions around those who may be. Let's face it, none of us want to be sick!!

**Contagious** – defined as the "spread from one person to another by direct or indirect contact." That's the most common definition of the word. But there is another definition we need to be aware of, one that relates to emotion vs a physical condition – "an emotion, feeling or attitude that is likely to spread to and affect others."

When we hear the word contagious, I doubt that we think of it in a positive light. Since childhood we've been instructed to "stay away" from anyone that's contagious!! # The Healing Ministry

(husband) Elimelech: "My God is King!" (wife) Naomi: "Pleasant" or "Delightful" (son #1) Mahlon: "Weak" or "Sick" (son #2) Chilion: "Tired" or "Dying" RUTTH RUTTH Welcome families to our Ministry Of Healing. Last month, all around the world, natural disasters affected so many families by the floods, fires, and deaths. Let us support them by praying for their healing. We can hear many asking, "Does God exist in this mordant world." A widow gave an answer from the Old Testament in the Book Of Ruth. As per ancient history, she was the grand-daughter of a king, idle worshiper, married from Ephrathites from Bethlehem, Juda (Ruth1:2) family, and she was a great grandmother of the future King David and the Son Of God. Her life's history during that period of very difficult times of disobedience to God of Israelites, violence, idolatry, and even in the time of crisis. She was Ruth, a non Israelite, and her life is a lesson for the present world to encourage us and to understand our God of Israelite at work. He has not forgotten us.

Ruth's life exhibited a model of our present world's daughter in laws and her admirable qualities, her faith, hard work, love, kindness, and bravery. The Book of Ruth is a perfect witnesses about God Almighty's impartial love and care. Let us sit comfortably, relax, and travel with Ruth in the Book of Ruth in the Old Testament. Her father in law, Elimelech, and mother in law, Naomi, and their sons, Mahlon and Chilion, moved to Moab to live. After they lived there ten years, Naomi's husband died and the two sons also died. Naomi's other daughter in law was Orpah and Ruth became a widow (Ruth1:4-5). In Naomi's life everything was a failure. The land was affected by famine, people were starving, and people were struggling to live. The three widows (Ruth1:6) found their way and a place to survive. Naomi was standing in an empty life and made a plan to return to her house in the Town Bethlehem.

The three widows are teaching us about three different self and selfless attitudes. These three widows may be bounded with their belongings, and looked around the place where they lived in the past ten years. They may have cried and silently walked out to the street. Many of their neighbors may have been standing and looking at these widows. Some of them whispered, "Oh look Naomi, Ruth, and Orpah, are they leaving our town? Where are they going? Poor Naomi, how she was happy among us. Everything happened like a tornado of death and they became widows. Are they travelling to somewhere alone without men?

The three women kept silent and waved their hands to the neighbors and said goodbye to them. They wiped their tears and started to walk passed the streets and then they came to the main road. Maybe Naomi felt this in heart heat, "I am an elderly woman is there any hope to start my life in fresh to re marry a man, have children, and everything. Why are my daughter in laws traveling with me and leaving their home city. They are young and they have a second chance for their futures. Let me talk to them and send them back to their parent's home." Naomi turned to her daughter in laws and said (Ruth 1:11-14) "Return home, my daughters. Why would you come with me? Am I going to have any more sons, who would become your husbands? Return my daughters, I am too old to have another husband. Even if I thought there was still hope for me, even if I had a husband tonight and then give birth to sons, would you wait until they grew up? Would you remain unmarried for them? No daughters, it is more bitter for me than for you, because the Lord's hand has gone out against me!"

In Ruth 1:14, "at this they wept again" Then Orpah kissed her mother in law goodbye. Orpah agreed and walked back to her home. Ruth and Orpah were sisters, as per the old history. After Orpah left she returned to her people. She got married, and become mother of Philistine and one of them was Goliath. In later years, Ruth's great, grandson, David, was killed Goliath. History says King David's General Ashai killed Orpah called Harafa.

Here on the road to ravel, Orpah took her rights for her life. In Ruth1:15, it says that Naomi said to Ruth, "Look your sister –in-law is going back to her home and to her gods. Go back with her. Ruth answered to her mother in law (Ruth1:16-17), "Don't urge me to leave you." Ruth was expressing her concern about how she can leave an elderly woman alone without help. Ruth expressed her loyalty, love, and to be with Naomi. She said, "Your people will be my people and your God my God. What an amazing woman Ruth was. She kept her faith in silence all these days, now she is announcing to Naomi about her belief in the God of Israel. She was revealing her silent conversion from the idle worship to the God of Israel.

Ruth is saying to us that God loves everyone, and God never denied her to accept Him. Ruth was never baptized by a preacher in a church. On the road the Gospel of God is announcing to Naomi. This was fulfilled when the Lord Jesus Christ was born as Jew. Ruth was his great greatgrand mother. Through him our entire world came to accept Christianity. In Act 10:35 says, "God accepts anyone, man or woman, who fear him and obey him and do what the right thing." God almighty work regardless of their sex race and nationality. Ruth again said to Naomi, "Where you die I will be buried." (Ruth1:17). Ruth expressed her extreme love and care for her mother-in-law. She doesn't want to break the connection, bondage, and the relationship on behalf poverty and helpless life.

Here Ruth is showing us, how her future grandson and the Son of God also shows his love and care to the poor widows. In Luke 1:14-17, The Lord Jesus Christ was at the gate of the village Nain. Ruth and Naomi are good models for our present world families. How to develop peace and joy among their families. They are showing us the values of a family, love, care, and unity. Ruth is teaching in a place of nowhere with no help and no money; but, Ruth's strong faith in God, trusting her mother in law, and willing to share good times as well the bad. Ruth never know how will be her life is going to be at Bethlehem. Ruth is offering her love to the widow and elderly mother in law. Ruth is teaching God's grace in the midst of all the difficulties, we should not allow our difficulties or disappointments to bind our opportunities. Amen.



Let us bow our heads and offer our prayers, " O God, my God Almighty, hear me (also widow). You are the God Almighty helper of the oppressed, upholder of the weak, protector of the forsaken, Savior of those without hope. Please, please God of my Father in heaven, and earth hear my prayer. Bless us and our families. Give us wisdom and knowledge to have unity within our families. Pour your love and compassion in our hearts, to share each other in our families. Help us to be peace makers in our families and everyone elses. In the name of the Lord, Jesus Christ, we are praying. Amen.

McKownville Methodist Church built a new sanctuary and educational wing 1959/1960 to alleviate the double sessions in worship services and Sunday schools that had been needed. With an increased congregation, help for the pastor >10 hours/week was wanted, especially with youth.

In May 1961 (after conference) Ralton Speers started as Supply Assistant and then Associate Pastor, serving first under Rev. Charles Warner & then in mid-1965 under Rev. James E. Beskin. At McKownville, he was to work with the junior high youth program and to assist in other church work. Ralton had become (October 1966 centennial celebration with Ral- a part-time local pastor in addition to his job as technical editor for General Electric. Ralton had served 10 years as part-time pastor at Gallupville Methodist Church before he was ordained as a Local Elder in May 1961 and appointed to McKownville.

The part-time pastoral position was eliminated as of June 30, 1973, because of financial constraints. Ralton was appointed to Rotterdam Junction where he served to his 1980 retirement after a stroke. Ralton and his wife Agnes returned to the McKownville congregation as members. The second picture is from the 1990 McKownville photo directory before Ralton's death in 1991.

## <u>Financial Status</u>

For the eight months January through August, actual income was \$4,713 short of budgeted and actual expenses were \$14,887 below budget. If this trend continues the next four months, we will come close to a balanced budget. For this to be a reality, giving must continue at its current pace. Expense uncertainties for the immediate months include a severe weather event and inflationary impacts. If you are behind in your pledge, please bring it up to date in the next few months. We thank our donors for faithful giving.

The Finance Team must present a budget to Leadership Council in November. To have a basis for planning the budget, we ask members and friends to estimate the amount of their support for 2024. Our Financial Campaign will start October 1. A letter was mailed September 27 to all persons who gave something in either 2023 or 2022. Pledges will be presented and dedicated at worship on Commitment Sunday, October 22. Please read the letter carefully, meditate on the generosity of God to you in the past, and then prayerfully make a financial commitment for 2024.

The Discipline of the United Methodist Church requires an annual audit of the financial records. We have been late in recent years in completing these audits. Our auditor recently completed a review of the Treasurer's 2020 books and found them to be maintained in a suitable fashion. Several recommendations were made about improving policies and procedures for future audits. These will be reviewed by Finance Team and reported to Leadership Council.

#### CHANGING THE WORLD...ONE PUMPKIN AT A TIME!

The McKownville UMC Pumpkin Patch, now operating its 24<sup>th</sup> year, has seen it's share of unusual circumstances. We have held this fundraiser through Frankenstorm, swept snow off the pumpkins, had the pumpkin tent blow up in the air and then collapse in the midst of high winds! We have LOST the pumpkin resupply truck and had it arrive several days late with spoiled pumpkins. We have had a Little Red Hen come visit the patch and find a resting place in amongst the orange globes. We have had a HS Football team unload pumpkins passing them person to person like they were passing a football. And we have had competitors try to buy us out. But we have also made friends within our community, had children come play in the pumpkin maze every year, and been a feature location for wedding photos, family photos and homecoming photos alike. Our patch and our mission has been featured on TV, inspired others into volunteer mission work, and provided funds for scholarships sending volunteers all over the globe. One thing we do know for sure is that PEOPLE LOVE PUMPKINS! We look forward to sharing the colors of the season with our neighbors.



And from seed to doorstep we are <u>Changing the World – One Pumpkin at a Time</u>! The Pumpkins start out in a growth circle in Farmington, NM grown by Navajo. Back when the PPF, LLC was initially looking for land in the mid-1990s, the Navajo were the most under-employed population in the US with limited labor skills and a failing economy. The organizers of the Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers found this to be an opportunity to bene-fit the Navajo population as well as their organization by teaching them farming skills. The Nation is now thriving and grows other crops year round in addition to the Pumpkins

we sell. The pumpkins then have to be shipped out to all the Not For Profit organizations that participate in the fundraiser across the country – so independent truckers are contracted to ship them. This provides work to the small business owners, not the big conglomerate trucking companies that usually get all the work. PPF supports these entrepreneurs by giving them the contracts to ship full truckloads. The organizations who receive them are like ours, raising money for a cause, be it Scouting, Habitat for Humanity or a local church. The organizations get to decide how their profit is used and are not responsible for paying for the pumpkins until the sale is completed. There is no risk or loss in this program as we do not pay for any broken, stolen or spoiled pumpkins, only what is sold calculated daily until October 31<sup>st</sup>. Once the sale is over, we at McKownville use some of the Pumpkins to make puree which is then turned into Pumpkin Pies at the Voorheesville UMC and donated to the Capital City Rescue Mission for Thanksgiving Dinner!

The money raised in the sale has created a fund called the Mission Scholarship Fund which is available to anyone wishing to participate in a mission trip. Scholarships encourage those who maybe could not afford a short term mission trip to participate without hesitation. Scholarships have also supported gifts to those whom we are providing service to through mission. If you are interested in learning more about Volunteers in Mission opportunities, please contact Angela or James Stott, Darcianne Leizer or Todd Nemec.



Here is what you can expect this year: The sale will operate its usual hours M-F 11a-7p; Saturdays 10a-7p and Sundays 12-6 through October 31<sup>st</sup>. The shifts to volunteer at the patch are usually 2-3 hours. Sign up in the back of the Sanctuary, by calling Angela Stott or by contacting the church office.

I can work with customers who reach out for large pumpkin orders based upon availability of what they are asking for. Please get their contact info and email me to work out a price and delivery. Prices are set by size not by weight and are determined by PPF. I cannot quote prices or sizes until they arrive. We get one delivery truck. So customers should come early in the month for the best selection. Pumpkins will not be any fresher for Halloween if they wait until later in the month.

## **THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT!!**

The church is planning on selling gift cards in November which will be available to both the church members and the community. For every gift card sold a percentage of the sale price will be donated back to the church. Each gift card has a different percent donated back depending on the vendor. For example: Macy's gives back 10% whereas Kohl's gives back 4%. There are over 750 different cards to choose from including Prepaid Visa's, restaurant cards, department stores, grocery stores, gas stations and places of entertainment. The purpose of this sale is to help raise money for the church's general fund. Gift cards can be used in a variety of ways.

1. Gift cards can be purchased to use as a gift for someone. With Christmas just around the corner it is the perfect solution for those who are hard to buy for.

2. Gift cards can be used to buy gifts for people. Do you like to shop for gifts at Target? How about Kohls? You can purchase a gift card and use that to do your shopping.






