# The Healing Ministry

He said, "If you listen carefully to the voice of the Lord your God and do what is right in His eyes, If you pay attention to His Commandments and keep His degrees, I will not bring on you any of the diseases brought on the Egyptian's for I am the Lord who heals you." (exodus 15:26)



Welcome everyone! We are in the month to celebrate Thanksgiving. How often and how many thanks can we offer to the Lord, God Almighty, that would be enough, because he did so much in our lives. Whether we are rich or poor or highly educated, God loves everyone without differential?

Many families will gather together to celebrate Thanksgiving. It doesn't matter about the concerns between families, because Thanksgiving will unit many families to share the love, varieties of food, and conversations. Many families are going to renew their love and unity on Thanksgiving Day. Along with the turkey and pumpkin pie smell,

may the families love be filled with each other and in their homes like a fragrance. Let us not forget to invite the Lord, Jesus Christ, to our Thanksgiving table. It is like the Last Supper, when our Lord will sit among us with a big smile and listen to our conversations. Wherever we need a healing, He will be there for us. Amen

During Thanksgiving, the main thing is that families will travel to meet and join with their sons, daughters, relatives, and friends to celebrate this day. I would like to ask everyone of you join to travel with the two widows, Naomi and Ruth, on their journey to Bethlehem. Please let us read the book of Ruth 1:19-22. The two widows were going to travel as per history for 7-10 days, 75KM/120Miles, and 3,750 feet distance. They had no man accompanying them. In the ancient period of the Judges, the women would not travel by themselves because it wasn't safe to travel alone. They may have used the King's Highway with Hills Track. These roads were safe for men but not for women. The faith that Naomi and Ruth had touched the God of Israel and his protecting hands of the God of Israel to watch over these two defenseless widows on their dangerous journey for their survival and safety to reach their destiny of Bethlehem.

The God of Israel had their future planned, as per Jeremiah 29:10-14, "I will come to you and fulfill my gracious promise to bring you back to this place, for I know the plans I have for you declared the Lord. The plans for prosperity and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me and I will listen to you. You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart. I will be found by you declare the Lord and will bring back from captivity. I will gather you from all the nations and places where I have banished you declared the Lord. And I will be bring you back to the place from which I carried you into exile."

Naomi and Ruth trusted the Lord God and traveled. They may have been tired and filled with dust on their face, clothes, feet, and were hungry. They saw the entrance of the town of Bethlehem. Naomi may have said to Ruth, "Ruth this is my home town where I was living." They arrived at Bethlehem, during the harvest season (April/May). Ruth the younger woman may have been excited looking around the farm lands that were filled with barley. The workers may have been cutting the ripened standing grain. In Ruth1:19, When they arrived the whole town starred at them and women exclaimed, "Can this be Naomi?" We can understand how the people of the town were shocked to see Naomi and Ruth. The Bethlehem people did not welcome Naomi and Ruth with flowers and music. The ancient history says, the day Naomi and Ruth arrived at Bethlehem, Boaz's wife died and the town people were returning home after the funeral. The people of Bethlehem saw Naomi and Ruth in the outskirt of the town. Naomi and Ruth arrived with nothing but empty hands.

Before, Naomi's life was in Bethlehem very pleasant. With her husband, she traveled by ancient canopy. She used to wear expensive silk, wool clothes. She wore expensive gold and silver jewels and look like a rich woman. Now she arrived to her home town, the home of bread, hungry, dust filled face, wearing old rags of clothes, and walked with bare feet. Some woman may have stood and whispered, "Look at Naomi, is this the rich man Elimelech's wife? She left from our town rich. What happened to her husband? Who is this young woman with her? Is she Locks Moabite's woman? She is beauti-

ful. The people of the town never knew Naomi and Ruth's return to Bethlehem was certainly part of God's plan in this town. Obed Samuel's prophet is going to be born. King David is going to be born, and Ruth is going to be great great grand mother for the Lord, Jesus Christ. But now they must start a hard life working to survive. But they both never gave up their faithful journey or pay attention to the people in the town.

Naomi and Ruth arrived in Bethlehem which was filled with fullness of barley harvesting. Ruth in 2:2 said to Naomi, "Let me go to the field and pick up the leftover grain behind anyone whose eyes I shall find favor." Ruth is showing that she will not sit at to the new place, and worry about the future. She was focusing on the present and her initial work goal of whatever is available to survive and help her mother in law. Not crumbling with Naomi, "Oh what you did for me to brought me up to this." No, she is not only beautiful, but very understanding, helping in nature, and loving. She is going to build a very precious family in the history of the world gospel. She is going to go and pick the carnal on the floor, and gather it in a basket. It is going to connect the Ministry of the Lord, Jesus Christ, teaching about the harvest.

Ruth is teaching the families to trust in the God of Israel, love one another, serve, support each other, focus on the possibilities, go forward, and do good for others and their families. Ruth was a beautiful woman; but she was the most beautiful woman in her faith and in her heart, and loved her mother in law and family. Amen.

Let us bow our head and pray,

"Dear loving Father, God Almighty, help us to seek you and help us to find you in our daily lives. We are inviting you as our precious guest for the Thanksgiving table. Pour you love on us and unite us. Let our hearts and minds celebrate this Thanksgiving Day. We are remembering those who are serving in uniform inside the United States and around the world. Lord, bless them to have joy and peace and bless their families to enjoy the celebration. We are remembering those who are homeless and hungry. May your loving table be put them around with your presence, varieties of food, and to be with them. Bless everything they need for their daily lives and future. We ask you this in you in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen...Amen...Amen...

Can you fill the bellies of 25 men in need? Can you provide a meal for the Capital District Area Council of Churches' Homeless Shelter in Albany, on the second or fourth Monday of any month between November 2023 and April 2024 on behalf of our church?



Our church has been blessed with enough volunteers to provide meals twice a month for many years, and I am praying that even more families or singles can find the time to make a meal again this year. If making the meal is too much for you, you can reach out to me to discuss the cost of providing the ingredients for me to make a meal on your behalf.

Meals are: entree, vegetable, dessert but no pork and no fish. Rolls, salad or other sides are optional but very much appreciated. (If you love to provide soup-to-nuts meals feel free to do so!) They have hearty eaters for whom dinner is the absolute highlight of their day. Meals do not need to include meat as their protein. Macaroni and cheese, vegetarian chili, rice and beans, etc. are some suggestions.

The Emergency Overflow Shelter is in the basement of First Lutheran Church located at 646 State Street in Albany. You can drop off your meal from 6-6:30 PM. When you arrive with your meal, please call the shelter at 518-426-1227 and staff will come to the door to receive your meal.

If you need to drop your meal off the day before, or the day it will be served, please mark clearly the date the meal is for and instructions for reheating it. You can generally drop off your meal from 10 AM - 4 PM at First Lutheran Church, weekdays.

# GIFT CARD FUND RAISER

We will be holding a gift card fund raiser beginning in November. We will be using Raise Right for this gift card fund raiser.

Raise Right has options for physical gift cards, E-gift cards and reloadable cards. The church will earn a percentage of the gift cards purchased. The percentage earned depends on the vendor. (Some vendors have higher percentages than others).

You will be receiving information on how to take advantage of this fund-raising event. Some information will come from the church and other information will come directly from Raise Right. We are hoping that not only will people buy gift cards but also get others to buy them as well.

Gift cards can be used to make everyday purchases such as groceries from vendors like Walmart and Target, clothing from The Gap or Macy's, gas from multiple locations, and take out from vendors like Chipotle and Panera. As a matter of fact, there are over 750 options for gift cards. We are targeting a November start so that people can use the cards as gifts, or to buy gifts for others for Christmas. Keep in mind however, that these cards can be used anytime throughout the year.



As Worship Leaders, you help set the tone that prepares the congregation for worship. Worship leader notes with service guidelines are in the attached document. (If you cannot open, let me know.)

One copy of the Worship Leader Reference is kept in the pulpit/lectern. The pastor or guest speaker can inform you if there are any changes.

#### Aids to being Worship Leader:

Service outline and scripture: Look at a copy or email of the worship outline to familiarize yourself with the service for which you will be Lay Worship Leader. This includes the church policy about wearing masks.

Be early and get ready: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.

The microphone will be turned on; if you are tall or short, you may need to move it closer to your mouth. The visuals team started a 5-minute timer on the monitors to help get the services started on time. The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.

Remember that worship is to God. Thank you for helping the congregants worship.







