## <u>Speak Up!!</u>



Should I speak up? Should I say something, or hold my tongue? Or, Why did I say that!!?? I wish I could take those words back!!! We live in a world where we are encouraged to speak up and if we "see something, say something." This is a positive step toward helping others, preventing crimes, and in general, to not allow bad situations to continue. We all have the ability to "speak up," and hopefully we can make the right choices on when to do so. But we all have times when we've

"held back" when we wish we spoke up, and "let it fly" when we wish we hadn't!

Our human nature leads us to both – we hesitate to speak up, perhaps out of fear or the thought of embarrassment; while other times we can't seem to control our emotions and we lash out with words that we wish were never spoken. On one hand, we can miss the opportunity to speak up and help someone, perhaps right a wrong; and on the other, we react and regretful words can come pouring out.

As Christians, we have a way to handle these situations. Before we speak up, we need to take a brief "time out" and speak Up! That is, to pause and ask our Lord for help. His Spirit will be with us and instill

within us the confidence we need to speak the words that need to be said, and the patience to help us in those times when we should simply remain silent. Our world is complex and confusing, when we don't know where to turn, we can always turn to Him. Jesus told us His Spirit would guide our words. Taking just a moment to turn to the Lord can prepare our hearts and minds to speak the words that will help others and help us to hold our words when our human nature tells us otherwise.



Welcome everyone to our *Ministry of Healing*. I hope by the grace of the God of the Israelites continue His blessings to all of you.

I would like to start by saying, "My humble thanks to everyone who offered prayers for my husband, George Ezekiel, who was called by God Almighty on June,14, 2024. And also for attending his funeral service and consoling me and my family. Thank you again. "

A widow's life experiences are very stressful. As Psalm 4:1 says," Be gracious to me and hear my prayers." Also Psalm 5:3 says, "Lord, in the morning you hear my voice, in the evening I plead my case to you and watch". Around the world widows may say just like the Psalms say. After I lost my husband, my life changed My new life is filled with so many challenges, so many needs, and need comfort to start and walk to live a changed life. The Lord, Jesus Christ, guided me to introduce to you two widows from the Old Testament.



In the Old Testament, the Book of 1 King Chapter 17, the Prophet Elijah showed up. He was challenged by the King of Ahab and his wife. Elijah said to the king, "As the Lord the God of Israel lives, whom I serve there will be neither dew nor rain in the next few years except my words." You can imagine how was the king and his wife were angry with the prophet Elijah and they wanted to kill him. God told him to move to Cherith and stay there. The Prophet Elijah was in the east of Jordan as God ordered. (1 King 17:1-6) God commanded to the ravens to deliver food for him. In general, the ravens were not allowed to be a pet bird in the homes. They had no chance to fly into a home to pick a pierce of bread or meat. The ravens got the assignment of meal delivery to eastern Jordan to Elijah. The ravens always picked the left overs from the garbage cans or just outside. As God commanded the ravens brought Elijah bread and meat in the morning and in the evening. I am amazed to read about the ravens. We the human God says his commandments from the Old

Testament period till our present day, are we doing what he says? But the raven's know the human need bread and meat for morning and evening. I have a question, "What are we learning from these little birds, the ravens?" We must listen carefully to what God says to us. If God gave us this assignment we may not like it. But the ravens searched for bread and meat, picked it up, flew to Elijah, and maybe dropped the food near him.

It's just like when you order an item from Amazon and it gets delivered at your door. The ravens teach us that no matter how bad the smell was near the garbage, they picked food for Elijah. And not only for one day but for several days. These ravens also showed selfless service. On seeing a piece of bread or meat without eating it they gave it to Elijah and took away his hunger. Aare we ready to do what God says for us to do in our daily lives? The ravens stopped dropping food and no water to drink in the brook. He got the next assignment (1King 17:7-16) Elijah was the place of testing his faith at Cherith. God said to him to move to Zarephath. He also said that he was commanded a widow at Zarephath to help him. Now from the east of Jordan to Zarephath might be 100 miles. He needed to walk maybe 40 days and nights. This would be very hard for us to do. In those days, there were no cars or air planes. They had to walk. He even walked through the dangerous mountains.

The Zarephath widow was not a rich woman. She was also facing difficult times not having enough food. She went near the Gate of Zarephath, and wanted to collect tree stems to burn for cooking. As she was collecting the sticks (1King 17:10-12) Elijah after walking a longest distance and being hunger and thirsty, he saw the widow. He called the widow and asked her to bring him some water. As she was going to get the water, Elijah called to her again and said, "And bring me a piece of bread." We can understand how the widow may have felt. If this took place today, may be the widow may have gotten angry and said, "Really, you came here and testing me." But the widow also a faith-filled woman replied, "As surely as the Lord your God lives, I don't have any bread only a handful of flour in a jar and a little oil in a jug. I am going to gather few sticks to take home and make a meal for myself and my son that we may eat it and die." The widow made already a plan. She may not want to ask for help from her neighbors or Elijah's help.



She shows her selfish and hopeless act also. Here God was testing both of their faiths The widow never knew that God sent Elijah to help her to get well and help her financially. We may also act like this widow did not want to pay attention to God or finances. When any family is having financial difficulties things may collapse. Those who have family faith will be drained out, and helplessness will surround them. Sometimes families will separated and go away from each other but we have help. God said to the prophet (Jeramiah 29:10-14), God has a plan for our futures and it will not hurt us because it has prosperities, hopes, and good futures. These words of God will lift us up and bless us.

I will continue next month on how the widow was helped by the prophet and how Elijah blessed the widow by the words of God. We need the quality of patiently listening to God and focusing on Him. He is always willing to help us. Let us allow Him to come into our lives, take of all our burdens, and give us all good plans of our futures.

Let us bow our heads and invite the holy presence of God of Israel and pray, "Lord, the most High God of Israel, we are coming to your throne and putting all the widows and their families in your hands. Wipe their tears, heal their sorrow, and may Your mercy bless them.

Lord, we are surrendering ourselves in your presence with our families. We are praying for our church, all the ministries, help us to serve and spread your gospel by reaching to all the communities around the Albany area and around the world. Bless us and all of our families needs. We thank you, honor you, and ask this in your precious name of Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen

## Memorials and Other Gifted Furnishings in 1898 McKownville Church

**A church built in 1898 replaced the original 1866 Mission Church** built on a site donated for \$1.00.

The 1898 church was **dedicated January 22, 1899**, as the **Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church**, perhaps in honor of Mr. Wiltsie of McKownville, a non-member who willed \$1000 (worth about \$37,900 in 2024 monies). This was about a third of the total \$3299.81 cost for the church (over \$125,000 in 2024 monies).

Additions to this church were built in 1928 (*Sunday School & community hall addition*), 1959/1960 (*new sanctuary & education wing*), and 1985/1986 (*Celebration Center*).



The picture late 1800s offering plate and **baptismal bowl** may have been first used in the earlier mission church.





The **Jesus as Shepherd window** was donated by the Ladies Sewing Society. It was originally in the front of the **1898** sanctuary but needed to be moved as a rebuilt one-manual organ was installed in its place in 1927.

The **Collection plates** (gift of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Jennings in memory of their daughter Minnie)

[By 1897 Aaron Jennings' home was in McKownville and was still there in 1928. When he died in 1931 in Albany, his siblings included Mrs. I. L. Helme and Mrs. H. C. Abrams of McKownville and a brother David Jennings in Albany.]

The **1922 baptismal font** (plaque says Presented by Mr. & Mrs. George Van Schaick 1922; on later list as the gift of Mr. George Van Schaick in memory of his wife).





The **1923/24 pulpit** (plaque says In Memoriam Sarah Witbeck Myers 1895 – 1923; on a later list as the gift of Mr. William Whitbeck in memory of his daughter Elizabeth)

New chancel furniture came in 1943 using monies given by Miss Emma Scott, a non-member – see below.

In **1944** – The **chancel with altar, rail and carpet** was dedicated November 19, 1944. A **service flag** was dedicated in honor of those serving "in the combatant forces."





A **cross and candlesticks** were dedicated as a memorial to Miss Emma Scott from whom \$5000 was received 1943 by the church in her will (over \$90,900 in 2024 monies).

**1943 Chancel Furniture** (See chairs & candlesticks also in picture above; see altar with cross to right.







The **Circa 1952** a **perpetual flame** was installed at the top center of organ pipes, given in memory of Harmon Vedder who died in 1950.

The **flame** was moved to the 1960 sanctuary but was returned in 1999 (after being rewired) to the front left of what is now **Wesley Chapel**. It was re-dedicated here May 23, 1999. (An *eternal light* was dedicated June 25, 2000, in the **1960 sanctuary**.)

The first study will be the DVD-based **Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controver sial Rabbi** with Amy-Jill (A-J) Levine.

Amy-Jill Levine notes "religion has been defined as designed to comfort the afflicted and to afflict the comfortable." Biblical parables serve to do the afflicting - to disturb us. These parables by a Jewish storyteller challenge us to search our hearts and discover more about our faith and our values. Knowing the historical context is important to our understanding. Then we seek meaning for the current day. "How do we translate them so that they can be heard still speaking?"



As Worship Leaders, you help set the tone that prepares the congregation for worship. Worship leader notes with service guidelines are in the attached document. (If you cannot open, let me know.)

One copy of the Worship Leader Reference is kept in the pulpit/lectern. The pastor or guest speaker can inform you if there are any changes.

Aids to being Worship Leader:

Service outline and scripture: Look at a copy or email of the worship outline to familiarize yourself with the service for which you will be Lay Worship Leader. This includes the church policy about wearing masks.

*Be early and get ready*: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.

The microphone will be turned on; if you are tall or short, you may need to move it closer to your mouth. The visuals team started a 5-minute timer on the monitors to help get the services started on time. The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.

Remember that worship is to God. Thank you for helping the congregants worship.






