
Welcome every one of you for our Ministry Of Healing. "HAPPY THANKS GIVING EVERYONE!." During the celebration of Thanksgiving, let us remember some families may have a tough time from their children. Or children may have forgotten their parents and don't visit them due to monetary issues. They need to heal from anger and being upset. Let us read about a father and son, from the Gospel of Luke15:11-24. This is a story told by our Lord Jesus Christ for us. We read these scriptures so many times, but today let us meditate with these Scriptures. The Lord will teach us, how to share, the forgiveness and welcoming.

We may have heard so many stories about families and how family wealth had affected their relationships. Did many families not have conflicts. I would say, "NO". Because of the wealth lots of brothers and sisters closed their relationship with each other. In Luke Chapter 15:11-24, says about a wealthy family father, and his younger son. Suddenly one day the younger son went to his father and said, " Father give me the share of the property that will belong to me." (Luke15:12) Wow! He got courage and asked this. He may be a young man and who wants to enjoy his life as he likes. If we look around the world, we can see some people like this young man. In present day, a father may be surprised because he is still alive and why would he need to share the younger son's part from his wealth? "Quickly bring the best robe and put on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet." (Luke 15:22) The father was showering his forgiveness f his son by his compassion and love.

How many fathers would be like this father in our world? Not many. I want to share a story about my father and how he was with me after I was accepted our Lord Jesus Christ, baptized in a Church, and had Christian wedding. My wealthy father told me a condition. 1) If you become a Christian and get married with a Christian wedding, from now on you are no more belong to my family. 2) You have no rights to claim any of my wealth that belongs to me. 3) You must hand over all your gold jewels to you only older sister. 4) If you want to see me and your mother, you can come as a visitor not as my daughter. I never said nothing and I handed over so much gold jewels to my sister. Myself and my husband just walked out of my parents home and return to our place. Every 3 years we would go and visit my parents for only 2 days. On the 3rd day we must get out of their house. I never touched any of my parent's wealth nor any gifts given for my 2 sons. All my parent's relatives had closed their hearts and doors to me. No more, even today. It's the same from my husband's side. Only because I was not born in the Christian family but converted as a Christian.



was sent out into the world from the God the Father. He had accepted his Father's plan to live among us, suffer for us, and give His life on the cross to redeem us. He did this out of compassion, love, and forgiveness on our behalf. On the third day he was resurrected and returned to God the Father. We can only imagine how the celebration was in heaven. We cannot even describe it. The Son of God is willing to help us. May we all join our hearts and minds to pray for all the young sons and daughters in our country and pray for them. 

Memorials and Other Gifted Furnishings in 1898 McKownville Church

1927 Epworth League at McKownville

The *Epworth League* of the Methodist Episcopal Church started in 1889 as a *young adult co-ed association for persons aged* 18 to 35 with the motto "*Look Up, Lift Up.*" Later, after a Junior Division was formed for younger persons, this age group beThis 1927 folded card (front side above, other side next page) from McKownville Methodist Episcopal Church was for the *Epworth League's Senior division* and notes its officers and the devotional topics for January – June. Their business meetings were held the second Friday of the month.



The local Epworth League officers were: President Mrs. H. E. Vedder,

1st Vice-President - Dept. of Spiritual Work Lena T. McLawry,

2nd Vice President – Dept. of World Evangelism Florence Mathusa,

3rd Vice-President – Dept. of Social Service Martin Mathusa,

4th Vice-President – Dept. of Recreation and Culture Harriet Hein,

Secretary Harmon Vedder, Treasurer M. Pearl Abrams, and Pianist Frances McLawry.

These 1927 **Senior Devotional Topics for the Epworth League** were developed nationally. The first, January 2, was *Beginning with an Inventory*, 2 Corinthians 13:5; Luke 13 14:25-35.

The persons listed locally for the various January 2 – June 26, 1927 Sunday evening devotional weekly meetings at 7:30 p.m. were: Marguerite Pendleton, Jeanette Momberger [circa 1935-37 led the female Sunshine Class], Emma Fahd [received as church member at McKownville 1931], George Momberger [joined 1927], Harold Lapham [joined 1925], Emma Winnie [Emma M. Winnie before 1930 married Harold G. Lapham], Harriet Clark [joined 1925], Marion Allanson [aunt of Marion Leizer, joined 1931], Ida Hein [joined 1928], M. Pearl Abrams, Grace Mathusa, Raymond Albright [joined 1925], Harold Clark, Florence Mathusa [joined 1925], Helen Manville [joined 1925], *Mr. I. Tynan* (pastor), John Clark, Mrs. H. E. Vedder [Helen?], Harriet Hein, Harmon Vedder [Harmon E. Vedder joined 1921; son Harmon Jr. joined 1926], Mildred Crouse [joined 1921], Libbie Johnson [joined 1919; her husband was James], Joe Stahl [Joseph joined 1925], *Mrs. I. Tynan* [Florence Tynan, the pastor's wife], Maude Abrams, and Martin Mathusa.

Rev. Irving Muir Tynan (1878 – 1935) pastored McKownville for the 1924/25 through the 1926/27 appointment years. Tynan graduated in 1907 from the *Union Missionary Training Institute* in Brooklyn and served fifteen years for the Board of Foreign Missions in **Burma** where he was ordained Deacon, then Elder. In 1916 he married Florence M. Fort of Mechanicville. Later *District Superintendent of the Burma Missionary Conference*, he returned with his wife to NYS April 1923 with two children Dunton & Sarah. Tynan first served as an assistant at Mechanicville, then McKownville, then Slingerlands church where he died.



The reception for incoming pastor and wife Rev. and Mrs. Charles W. S. Becker was May 5, 1927. On June 12, presumably someone subbed for Pastor Tynan's wife who had been assigned then.

I have heard many wonderful stories from the patch about time spent sharing and visiting with each other. What I love most about this venture is that our whole church family has really bonded together to support this project. I like to say "from seed to scrap" this pumpkin patch supports God's Kingdom!

Many of our patch sitters can tell you the story of how our patch supports the Navajo, and the independent truckers. We can all name at least one mission trip someone from our church community has taken with scholarship money from the patch.

And after our sale a handful of people get together to make 100+ pumpkin pies for the Capital City Rescue Mission. What cannot be used for pies are sent to local farms to supplement their feed for the winter.

Thank you for all you do to support all of these projects.

In our patch, a man walking down the street picked a penny up off the ground and gave it to James in the patch. He said "I don't have enough to buy a pumpkin - but every penny helps, right?" It made me think of the scripture about the offering of a penny worth more than a large sum to someone who has nothing.

Another woman came to the patch and asked if her son could see the inside of our church as he had many questions about church and God. That may have opened the door to a new faith for that young person being the first time he was welcomed inside.

Another customer asked if she could just sit and chat for a while with one of our volunteers feeling so welcomed she was happy to have someone to talk with.

Look at the ways the pumpkin patch can open doors! A completely volunteer run program here at McKownville is truly Changing the World One Pumpkin at a Time.

Meals for the Homeless Shelter



Can you fill the bellies of 25 men in need? Can you provide a meal for the Capital District Area Council of Churches' Homeless Shelter in Albany, on the second or fourth Wednesday of any month starting in November and going through April, on behalf of our church? This year the Shelter is also in need of meals the second and fourth Thursdays as well as the fifth Wednesday in January through April.

Our church has been blessed with enough volunteers to provide meals twice a month for many years, and I am praying that even more families or singles can find the time to make a meal again this year. If making the meal is too much for you, you can reach out to me to discuss the cost of providing the ingredients for me to make a meal on your behalf.

Meals are: entree, vegetable, starch and dessert but no pork and no fish. Rolls, salad or other sides are optional but very much appreciated. They have hearty eaters for whom dinner is the absolute highlight of their day. Meals do not need to include meat as their protein. Macaroni and cheese, vegetarian chili, rice and beans, etc. are some suggestions. In addition, the Shelter can obtain chicken or ground beef from the Regional Food bank if cost is a factor, I just need advance notice to have that ordered.

The Emergency Overflow Shelter has moved and is now located in THE FIRST CHURCH OF ALBANY on the corner of Pearl and Orange Streets. Drop off the fully cooked meal between 6:00-6:15 PM. When you arrive with your meal, please call the shelter at 518-426-1227, open your trunk and staff will come to your car to receive your meal. You will not have to carry it to the door as in the past.

Currently, there is no early drop off of the meal, but I may be able to assist you with the drop off, if I am in town.

Raise Right Gift Cards



Our church is participating in a gift card fundraiser. This fund raiser allows people to purchase gift cards from a variety of participating vendors and help raise money for the church. While this fund raiser is ongoing, we would like to encourage this during the Christmas season so that you can make the best of your gift card needs. It is easy to do! We have found that placing a bulk order is the most efficient way for our church to participate.

How does it work? For each gift card purchased a percentage comes back to church. Hannaford Supermarket, for example, will give 3.5% of the purchase back to the church and Jimmy Johns will give 8%.

What do I need to do? Take a gift card packet from the back of the sanctuary, then ask your friends and family if they need any gift cards. Fill out the order form for any cards that you want. Once you have it filled out, write a check to The McKownville UMC for the total and return it to Kelly Visker.

Why should I do this? This is good for both you and the church. You have purchasing needs, and these gift cards are a way to fulfil those needs. We have members who are regularly buying Hannaford Gift cards to use for their weekly groceries through Raise Right. Since they are purchasing their groceries there anyways it was beneficial to also help the Church. It is a win-win situation. Do you buy Hams from the Honey Ham Company? Why not get a gift card and support the church while buying your Christmas Ham? Do you give gift cards as Christmas gifts or stocking stuffers? Buy then from Raise right and a portion of the proceeds go back to church.

Details: Orders and payments need to be to Kelly Visker by December 8th, this will ensure delivery well before Christmas.* All cards will be bulk emailed to Kelly, and she will distribute them when they arrive. 

Be early and get ready: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.


