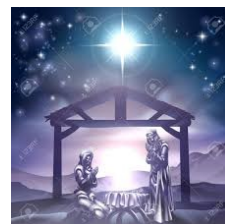
ADVENT

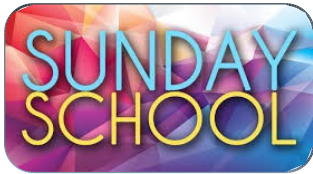

Can you fill the bellies of 25 men in need? Can you provide a meal for the Capital District Area Council of Churches' Homeless Shelter in Albany, on the second or fourth Wednesday of any month starting in November and going through April, on behalf of our church?

Our church has been blessed with enough volunteers to provide meals twice a month for many years, and I am praying that even more families or singles can find the time to make a meal again this year. If making the meal is too much for you, you can reach out to me to discuss the cost of providing the ingredients for me to make a meal on your behalf.

Meals are: entree, vegetable, starch and dessert but no pork and no fish. Rolls, salad or other sides are optional but very much appreciated. They have hearty eaters for whom dinner is the absolute highlight of their day. Meals do not need to include meat as their protein. Macaroni and cheese, vegetarian chili, rice and beans, etc. are some suggestions. In addition, the Shelter can obtain chicken or ground beef from the Regional Food bank if cost is a factor, I just need advance notice to have that ordered.

The Emergency Overflow Shelter has moved and is now located in THE FIRST CHURCH OF ALBANY on the corner of Pearl and Orange Streets. Drop off the fully cooked meal between 6:00-6:15 PM. When you arrive with your meal, please call the shelter at 518-426-1227, open your trunk and staff will come to your car to receive your meal. You will not have to carry it to the door as in the past.

Many of you may have had many difficult experiences in this year 2025. Many of you may have had success, some failures, and some unable to complete plans as planned. But God knows our daily lives and He is our helper. Let us prepare for the birth of the Savior and for the coming of the New Year, 2026. Every one of us is praying for the new year. We have a promise from God. The prophet Jeremiah 29:11, says, "I know the plan I have for you, 1. Plan of welfare and not for evil, 2. To give you a future and hope." We are in the mood for preparing the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas. All around the world people send Christmas card. This is an evangelism of sharing the good news. The day when Jesus Christ was born the angels were spreading the good news as well. We all know the Lord Jesus was born in the manger in the town of Bethlehem. After he was born, the good news was first announced by an angel to shepherds nearby. Why God the Father selected the shepherds? There was a very unique reason, and he selected the shepherds to receive the good news. On the day Christ was born, an angel of the Lord appeared to the shepherds who were keep watching over their flocks. The glory of the Lord shown all around them and they were filled fear. The script says this angel was angle Gabriel. The angel said to them, "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people. For to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you. You will find the baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and laying in a manger." Traditionally the shepherds field was located in Beit Sahour a few miles east of Bethlehem. These shepherds were connected to the Temple of Jerusalem. They were special too and trained by priests to inspect the newly born lambs who were destined for sacrifice. They were shepherd priests, and they were watching flocks set aside for temple sacrifices possibly Passover lambs. The angel delivered a message by telling the Shepherds the animal sacrifices were going to be over. Because the Savior Christ, the Lord, had come to be the lamb and universal sacrifice for sin. After the shepherds received the good news of the birth of the Savior, immediately they believed it.



The angel made three announcements about the Savior, Christ and Lord, which meant Jesus' deity, authority, mission, and royalty. During the birth of Jesus, Caesar must respect the hailed as a Roman Emperor, Savior and Lord. The angel confirmed and announced that God is the true Savior and Lord. The shepherds understood all three titles of the Lord. The Heavenly army also singing, praising and celebrating Christ's birth. (Luke2:13) The shepherds found the Holy baby wrapped in swaddling clothes just like the angel told them. Swaddling in Greek temple priest.

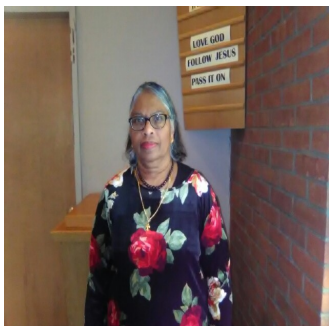


Healing Ministry




Some scholars says that Zaharias and his wife Elizabeth, Mary's cousins, gave swaddling clothes from the temple, when she visited them earlier in her pregnancy. (Luke 1:39-40) These clothes were prepared of animal skin after a ceremonial sacrificed. S waddling clothes is symbolized as Jesus' holiness and God's plan for Him. He is going to be a perfect sacrifice for our sin. While the shepherds saw the swaddling clothes wrapping the Savior, they immediately understood the Savior. "The shepherds returned glorifying and praising and for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they been told. (Luke 2:20) Let us humble ourselves to the Savior just like the shepherds had done. Let us make a room for Him in our hearts and homes. Let us carry the good news to our relatives, neighbors and everyone else. Let us remember all the shepherds around the world in our prayers.

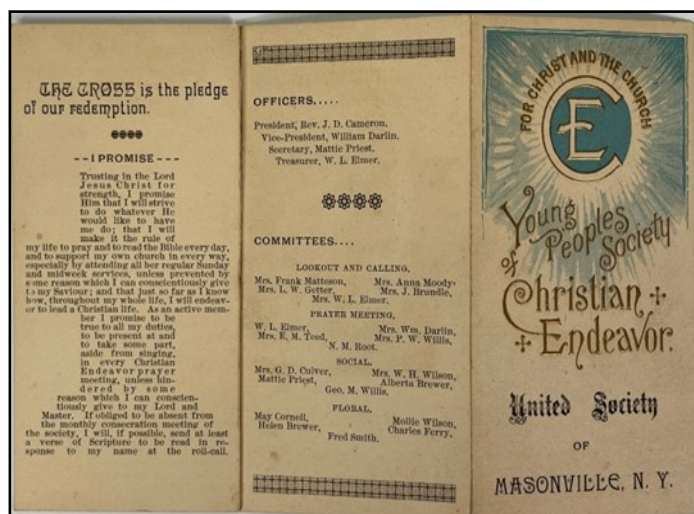


OUR HISTORY

Christian Endeavor The first Young People's Society

The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor's was first formed in Portland, Maine at Williston Congregational Church (actually in the parsonage parlor) on February 2, **1881** by its pastor Rev. Francis E. Clark to involve more of the young people in his congregation. **Children then had Sunday Schools while adults had Bible studies and worship services but there was nothing for young people to keep them in church.** This was the first Christian youth fellowship and was the start of a Youth Ministry Movement.

Rev. Clark had the young people sign a pledge to be active participants "*for Christ and the Church.*" They ran their own committees and were involved in various worship activities. The Christian Endeavor society spread, especially after a newspaper article on it, to all the states of the United States and to other countries. By the year 1906 there were over four million members of Christian Endeavor around the world in over 67,000 societies.

After World War I, C.E.'s numbers declined, partly as some denominations founded their own youth fellowships. However, Christian Endeavor is still active with one entity for societies in the United States and Canada and another entity (headquartered in Germany) for other societies worldwide.

While Christian Endeavor societies were initially formed in congregations of the **Methodist Episcopal Church**, this denomination was concerned that the "congregational" origins and independence of Christian Endeavor could undermine M.E.'s strong episcopal structure with authority over each church. So, the M.E. Church

formed its own youth organization in **1890**, the **Epworth League** which was then recognized and adopted in 1892 by M.E.'s General Conference, including the provision that "the pastor shall have general supervision of the League."

However, Christian Endeavor societies remained in some of the Methodist churches that had started such societies before Epworth League was formed.



For example, in October **1894** when the New York State convention of Christian Endeavor was held in Albany in Harmanus Bleecker Hall, the sponsoring *Albany C. E. Union* included members from the **First, Trinity and Ash Grove Methodist churches of Albany**. [Ash Grove M.E. moved to the Pine Hills section in 1912 and became Calvary Methodist which later merged in 1994 with Calvary-St. Luke's to become Emmaus UMC, which church closed in 2023. *First Methodist* – after its property was taken for the Empire State Plaza – merged in 1963 with *Trinity UMC*, which closed in June 2025.] *The two 1894 C. E. ribbons shown were in Trinity's archives.*



An **Epworth League** chapter was referenced by 1895 in the Guilderland-McKownville charge and specifically at the **McKownville Methodist Episcopal Church** end of the charge by 1902. What became the **Guilderland Federated Church** was formed in **1920** from the Presbyterian *Hamilton Union Church* and the *Guilderland M. E. Church* (which latter had built in 1866 its *Mission on the east* at McKownville). As McKownville was not part of the new federation, it gained the ability to have Sunday service in the morning.

In July **1922** the **Christian Endeavor Society of Guilderland Federated Church** received a prize at a Binghamton convention for having the largest number of their members present in the state, outside of the host county (13 delegates, practically 50 per cent of the membership, with the society just one year old).

December 1 – session 1. God Has a Face (preparing for Christmas, making room for Christ)

Focus: "The celebration of Advent is possible only to those who are troubled in soul, who know themselves to be poor and imperfect, and who look forward to something greater to come." – Dietrich Bonhoeffer

December 8 – session 2. Worship Works Wonders (worship as a way to prepare)

Scripture: Oh, how my soul praises the Lord. How my spirit rejoices in God my Savior! ... For the Mighty One is holy, and he has done great things for me. – Mary, the mother of Jesus (Luke 1:46-47, 49 NLT)

December 15 – session 3. God Guides the Wise (follow the light of Christ)

Scripture: The star they had seen in the east guided them to Bethlehem. It went ahead of them and stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were filled with joy. - Matthew 2:9-19 NLT

Focus: "The wise men see new life as a promise and they bless it; Herod sees new life as threat and curses it." – Ronald Rotheiserz

December 29 – session 4. Every Heart a Manger (receiving God's love)

As Worship Leaders, you help set the tone that prepares the congregation for worship. Worship leader notes with service guidelines are in the attached document. (If you cannot open, let me know.)

One copy of the Worship Leader Reference is kept in the pulpit/lectern. The pastor or guest speaker can inform you if there are any changes.

Aids to being Worship Leader:

Service outline and scripture: Look at a copy or email of the worship outline to familiarize yourself with the service for which you will be Lay Worship Leader. This includes the church policy about wearing masks.

Be early and get ready: On Sunday, please arrive at the church fifteen minutes prior to the service for which you are serving and check up front.

The microphone will be turned on; if you are tall or short, you may need to move it closer to your mouth. The visuals team started a 5-minute timer on the monitors to help get the services started on time. The worship leader can begin the greetings to the congregation after the timer counts down to zero and the organist/pianist is seated. In the fall, the Pastor may start handling this and announcements again.

Remember that worship is to God. Thank you for helping the congregants worship.
